4 Equality/Human Rights/Rural Proofing Issues

Equality Impact Assessment

Under Section 75 of the Northern Ireland Act 1998, public authorities have a statutory duty to promote equality of opportunity. Preliminary screening exercises have been undertaken and there is no evidence that the proposed measures will have any impact on any of the groups specified in Section 75. Therefore, the Department does not consider a full Equality Impact Assessment to be necessary.

Human Rights Issues

The Human Rights Act 1998 implements the European Convention on Human Rights which makes it unlawful for any public authority to act in a way that is incompatible with these rights. The Department considers that the proposals contained in this consultation paper are compatible with the Human Rights Act 1998.

Rural Proofing

Rural proofing is a process to ensure that all relevant Government policies are examined carefully and objectively to determine whether or not they have a different impact in rural areas from that elsewhere, given the particular character of rural areas. Consideration should be given to the policy adjustments that could be made to reflect rural needs so that, as far as possible, public services are accessible on a fair basis to the rural community. The Department considers that the measures contained within the draft Action Plan are unlikely to have any different impact in rural areas to that within any other sector of the community.

Regulatory Impact Statement

The Department has not carried out a Regulatory Impact Assessment on the implications of the draft Industry Noise Action Plan as it does not consider that the Action Plan will place any financial burden, in addition to that which is imposed by the END itself, on organisations involved in action planning. The Action Plan will have no immediate impact on businesses or the voluntary sector.

The Action Plan follows the approach set out in the Department's Technical Guidance on Noise Mapping and Action Planning, and provides a framework within which the Department of the Environment/Northern Ireland Environment Agency can comply with the requirements of the END.

5 European Directives and Brexit

The referendum on 23 June 2016 resulted in a decision that the UK should leave the European Union. However, until such time as exit negotiations are concluded, the UK remains a full Member of the European Union, and all the rights and obligations associated with EU membership remain in place. EU legislation will continue to be negotiated, implemented and applied during this period. It is the outcome of those exit negotiations that will determine the arrangements that should apply in relation to legislation in the future once the UK has left the European Union.

6 Introduction to the Round 3 Industry Noise Action Plan

The European Parliament and Council Directive relating to the assessment and management of environmental noise (the Environmental Noise Directive 2002/49/EC (END)) was transposed in Northern Ireland through the Environmental Noise Regulations (Northern Ireland) 2006 ("the Regulations").

The three main objectives of the Directive are:

- To determine the noise exposure of the population through noise mapping;
- To make information on environmental noise available to the public; and
- To develop Action Plans based on the mapping results, to reduce noise levels where necessary, and to preserve environmental noise quality where it is good.

The Directive required Member States to produce Strategic Noise Maps for the main sources of environmental noise, namely, roads, railways, airports and industry in agglomerations with more than 250,000 persons (Greater Belfast) in 2007 (Round 1 noise mapping). Further strategic maps for smaller roads, railways, airports and

industry in agglomerations with more than 100,000 persons were made in 2012 (Round 2) and 2017 (Round 3). Maps are to be prepared every 5 years thereafter.

In Northern Ireland the following entities were appointed under the Regulations as the Competent Authorities responsible for preparing the Noise Maps and Action Plans for each noise source:

- Road noise Roads Service, Dfl;
- Railway noise Translink (Northern Ireland Transport Holding Company);
- George Best Belfast City Airport noise George Best Belfast City Airport;
- Belfast International Airport noise Belfast International Airport; and
- Industrial noise –DAERA/NIEA.

The Round 3 Industry Noise Action Plan (Annex I) sets out how DEARA/NIEA, as the Competent Authority for industrial noise, will deliver their obligations under the Environmental Noise Directive.

This Round 3 Industry Noise Action Plan is prepared pursuant to the Regulations. The Plan follows the approach set out in the Department's Technical Guidance on Noise Mapping and Action Planning issued in 2013, and provides a framework within which DAERA/NIEA can comply with the requirements of the END.

The Action Plan analyses the results of the noise mapping in terms of the area, number of properties and number of individuals exposed to various levels of noise. The Plan identifies the numbers of people affected by the highest levels of industrial noise in the Belfast agglomeration and targets the top 1% for further investigation.

Section 2 (above) sets out the process for providing comments on the Round 3 Industry Noise Action Plan.
