In total 33,222 Section 75 Surveys have been issued to NIRDP 2014-2020 scheme applicants¹. 12,770 have been completed / partially completed, giving a total programme response rate of 38 per cent.

Weighting was applied to each scheme based on their proportion of the total programme applications. For analysis purposes, this means the Section 75 results are representative of all 33,222 applicants.

Gender

14 per cent of the 33,222 RDP applicants are female. This is low in comparison to 50 per cent of the rural population reported as female and 24 per cent of the farm labour force.



Disability

6 per cent of the RDP applicants are disabled, which is low compared to 26 per cent of the rural population and 30 per cent of farmers.



Racial Group

Almost 100 per cent of the RDP applicants are white, which compares with 99 per cent of the rural population in the Census.



Sexual Orientation

99 per cent of the RDP applicants are recorded as heterosexual. This figure is comparable to 97 per cent of the population recorded as heterosexual in the Northern Ireland Life and Times survey.

Religion



46 per cent of RDP applicants are from the Catholic community compared to a rural population figure of 47 per cent and a farming context figure of 42 per cent.

Age

33 per cent of the applicants are aged between 16 and 40 years old which is low compared to 42 per cent of the rural population but high compared with 8 per cent of Northern Ireland farmers.

From both postal and online applications, there was 4,147 valid Tranche 1-3 applications received. There were no Section 75 survey forms issued to postal applications in Tranche 3 and therefore only 4,131 S75 forms were issued.

In total 3,523 completed / partially completed S75 forms have been received giving a valid survey response rate of 85 per cent. All applicants are required to be farm managers and were successful in being accepted onto the scheme

Gender



5 per cent of the beneficiaries are female. This is comparable with the results of the farm structure survey which indicates that around four per cent of farmers are female.



Disability

3 per cent of the beneficiaries are disabled which is low compared to the farming context figure of 30 per cent.



Racial Group

Almost 100 per cent of the beneficiaries are white which compares with 99 per cent of the rural population in the Census.



Sexual Orientation

Almost 100 per cent of the BDG beneficiaries are recorded as heterosexual. This figure is comparable to 97 per cent of the population recorded as heterosexual in the Northern Ireland Life and Times Survey.



Religion

60 per cent of the beneficiaries are from the Protestant community. This is high compared to a farming context figure of 51 per cent.

In total there are 8,780 people who have attended Farm Family Key Skills training to date with 781 Section 75 forms completed and returned by post or online giving a response rate of 9 per cent. The scheme is open to farmers, their families and the farm labour force.



Gender

31 per cent of the beneficiaries are female. This is high when compared with the results of the Farm Structure Survey which suggests that around 24 per cent of the farm labour force are female.



Disability

8 per cent of the beneficiaries are disabled which is low compared to 26 per cent of the rural population reported as disabled.

Gender



Across both Tiers and Tranches, around 5 per cent of S75 responses were female. These figures are comparable with the Farm Structure Survey which suggests around 4 per cent of farmers are female.

Disability



When compared to disability reported in the farming community (30 per cent), figures across all Tiers and Tranches for BIS are low. There is little variation between Tiers and Tranches and figures for disability among applicants is around 2 per cent.



Racial Group

99 per cent of the rural population in the Census are white which compares with the breakdown for all the BIS Tiers and Tranches.



Sexual Orientation

97 per cent of the population recorded as heterosexual in the Northern Ireland Life and Times survey. Applicants across BIS Tiers and Tranches are comparable at over 99 per cent.



Religion

In the farming context, 51 per cent are from a Protestant background. Based on survey responses, figures for both Tiers and Tranches for BIS are higher as total application figures range from 57 per cent to 63 per cent. There is little difference in application success rates compared to total application rates.

Age



The rate for young farmer applicants (16-40) is around 48 per cent for Tier 1 and 60 per cent for Tier 2 which is much higher than 8 per cent figure in the DAERA equality indicator report.

There were 567 people who applied for Environmental Farming Scheme Higher (EFSH) payments in 2019 and 123 Section 75 forms were completed online resulting a response rate of 22 per cent.



2,336 people applied for Environmental Farming Scheme Wider (EFSW) payments in 2019 and 336 Section 75 forms were completed online, giving a response rate of 14 per cent.

9 per cent of the beneficiaries are female. This is higher in comparison to the results of the Farm Structure Survey that suggest around 4 per cent of farmers are female.



Disability

8 per cent of the beneficiaries are disabled which is low compared to disability in the farming community recorded at 30 per cent.



Racial Group

Based on the survey responses, almost all the beneficiaries are white compared with 99 per cent of the rural population in the Census.



Sexual Orientation

99 per cent of the beneficiaries are recorded as heterosexual. This figure compares with 97 per cent of the population recorded as heterosexual in the Northern Ireland Life and Times Survey.



Religion

A total of 108 Section 75 forms were returned from Northern Ireland's 221 LAG Board members giving an overall response rate 49 per cent in 2018 compared to 87 per cent in 2016.



88 per cent of respondents indicated they are board members, 10 per cent respondents indicated they are LAG member and not a board member and 6 per cent of respondents did not answer the question.



49 per cent of respondents indicated they are public representative (i.e. member of the council) and 51 per cent of respondents indicated they are a private representative (i.e. not a member of the council) or did not answer the question.



Gender

The proportion of female members has increased from 31 per cent in 2016 to 37 per cent in 2018. This is low compared to the rural population context figure of 50 per cent.



Disability
