Shared Learning Programme



Community groups across Belfast and Derry-Londonderry are very experienced in developing innovative approaches to social challenges. The Urban Villages Initiative helps local groups and residents across all five Urban Village areas to build connections and share learning on ways to make a difference.

The Colin Allotments and Healthy Living Centre in West Belfast hosted a Shared Learning event in November. This is one of the region's biggest allotments projects and includes a community facility constructed from repurposed shipping containers.

Presentations highlighted ways the Allotments are used to support educational and health outcomes. This includes cooking and horticultural courses for residents and school children. The Public Health Agency and Colin Men's Shed showcased community initiatives promoting mental health.

First time visitors to Colin came away with new contacts and sources of advice to advance similar initiatives in their own areas.

New Year resolutions were very topical at a Health and Wellbeing event in Derry-Londonderry in January. The Shared Learning event at Bishop Street Community Centre highlighted community based approaches to promoting healthy lifestyles.

The work of the Bogside and Brandywell Health Forum showcased school, family-based and workplace approaches to good health. The Pink Ladies Cancer Support Group demonstrated the power of committed people and volunteers to support others. Dove House Community Trust highlighted the importance of financial support and advice services to help people at times of crisis. People also left the event in Derry-Londonderry with a better understanding

of creative techniques to support wellbeing and the delivery of health based approaches.

Promoting wellbeing through community development

‘to restore a sense of hope and positivity to a community which has suffered so much’ says Séan Devlin of YEHA



Over 400 people braved the snow one December evening to hear a local school, folk choirs and special guests ‘The Priests’ perform in Sacred Heart Church.

A free concert, it was a Carezone initiative ‘to restore a sense of hope and positivity to a community which has suffered so much’ says Séan Devlin of YEHA (Youth, Education, Health, Advice), one of the partners in the project.

Local youths distributed 3,000 invitations door-to-door. There were children’s activities, Christmas street-signs with messages of hope, and a questionnaire on how people feel about their community and what they’d like to change.

Carezone operates in the Sacred Heart Parish: Greater Oldpark, Cliftonville, Marrowbone and Deerpark areas. **It holds events to lift community spirit, promote wellbeing, engage with local people** not normally involved in consultations, and advocates for government policies to reflect their needs.

The Carezone grew from a discussion on suicide prevention called by the Health Minister in 2016, where participants

agreed that a ‘bottom-up’ community development approach would help improve mental health in disadvantaged areas.

Led by Lighthouse with support from Public Health Agency and Belfast Healthy Cities, Carezone is a collaboration between 32 statutory and community groups. The Urban Villages Initiative invested in the Carezone programme to support this collaborative community event.

Let it grow- NBWISP*

Living in cities, our children, and ourselves too, are rarely outdoors, losing precious chances to connect with nature and each other.

Let it Grow is a pilot project run by NBWISP in the North Belfast Urban Village area, helping groups and schools to create gardens and growing spaces, or enhance existing ones in their communities and on their premises.

Currently, 61 children from Holy Cross Girls and Wheatfield Primary Schools

are midway through working on this programme, and nine adults are on course to successfully complete an OCN qualification in Garden Horticulture.

The project builds up expertise and sustained interest so that participants will keep the gardens growing through summer months when schools are closed, and winter months when growing is at a minimum.

So far, the children have learnt to recognise herbs and seasonal vegetables.

They've been taught about tool safety and weeds, planting herbs, sowing seeds/bulbs, soil types, propagation, garden pests, bug identification and edible flowers. They've made hanging baskets and a bug hotel and learnt how to create a harvest display.

The gardens have been put to sleep for a few weeks, but the children love the programme and are looking forward to getting back together and restarting in February.

Ardoyne Youths want us to **Listen Up!**



Children's Commissioner
Koulla Yiasouma added:

“The days of designing and planning laws, policies and services without young people are behind us, and this report reminds us of this. I share the concerns that young people have raised, particularly concerning mental health.”

Recently, the Northern Ireland Commissioner for Children and Young People, Koulla Yiasouma, and students from Mercy College helped launch Listen UP!, the report on a survey by Ardoyne Youth Enterprise (AYE) of over 150 young people of 12-17yrs in Ardoyne/Marrowbone.

AYE Director Shane Whelehan said: *“As advocates for young people’s needs, we wanted to hear their opinions and share*

them widely. Their comments are frank, thoughtful, sometimes humorous, often very moving. We were struck by their calls to be heard and respected by service providers and decision makers.”

Linsey Farrell, Urban Villages Initiative Programme Director, commented: *“This is a fantastic piece of work that the young people have put together, and we are*

delighted to have been able to support the project. Listening to the voice of young people is so important to help inform us as to where investment may be needed to build capacity in north Belfast.”

The 4th December 2017 was a happy occasion in Benview Park. Miriam McAlister, a dedicated worker at Ballysillan Youth for Christ (BYFC) for 18 years, cut the ribbon of the group's extended and renovated Blue Houses centre. The event showcased the new building, and it was a fantastic opportunity to celebrate BYFC's first 25 years and look forward to the future. Over 200 community members of all age groups attended, mixing with volunteers, board members, funders and local MLAs and MPs.

BYFC offers informal youth work in Ballysillan. Manager Peter Thompson feels the new building could have a far-reaching impact:

"We dream of other organisations using it for the valuable work they do. We dream of it being a hub for social enterprise, upskilling those in the community to deliver creative services that are then reinvested into their community. We dream of it being a space for parents, walking alongside them and their children.

But more than anything we dream that it remains a home, a place where community exists and where people can fulfil their potential, and for them to know how special, unique and loved they are."


