Shared Learning Programme



Community groups across Belfast and Derry-Londonderry are very experienced in developing innovative approaches to social challenges. The Urban Villages Initiative helps local groups and residents across all five Urban Village areas to build connections and share learning on ways to make a difference.

The Colin Allotments and Healthy Living Centre in West Belfast hosted a Shared Learning event in November. This is one of the region's biggest allotments projects and includes a community facility constructed from repurposed shipping containers.

Presentations highlighted ways the Allotments are used to support educational and health outcomes. This includes cooking and horticultural courses for residents and school children. The Public Health Agency and Colin Men's Shed showcased community initiatives promoting mental health.

First time visitors to Colin came away with new contacts and sources of advice to advance similar initiatives in their own areas.

New Year resolutions were very topical at a Health and Wellbeing event in Derry-Londonderry in January. The Shared Learning event at Bishop Street Community Centre highlighted community based approaches to promoting healthy lifestyles.

The work of the Bogside and Brandywell Health Forum showcased school, family-based and workplace approaches to good health. The Pink Ladies Cancer Support Group demonstrated the power of committed people and volunteers to support others. Dove House Community Trust highlighted the importance of financial support and advice services to help people at times of crisis. People also left the event in Derry-Londonderry with a better understanding





of creative techniques to support wellbeing and the delivery of health based approaches.

Tackling Poverty Strategic Approach to Tackling Poverty in East Belfast

Urban Villages Initiative in FastSide

It will create a pathway of support services that ensure a holistic approach to the poverty issue in EastSide.

The Scaffolding Project is a group of community and voluntary organisations in the EastSide Urban Village area that have come together to work collaboratively to deliver anti-poverty services.

Through a strategic approach, the project aims to maximise existing resources and foster partnerships among community and voluntary organisations and statutory agencies. It will create a pathway of support services that ensure a holistic approach to addressing need.

The project will provide assistance in crisis situations, offer advice on benefits, housing, counselling and training for employment, and it will facilitate campaigns and events that raise awareness of ongoing need. The Scaffolding Project has been active and has undertaken several significant events to date.



RECYCLING SCHOOL UNIFORMS: A community appeal was made for donations of school uniforms to be re-cycled. The principle of the initiative is 'give and receive' allowing people to donate uniform and/or choose items for their children's new school year. This enterprise was widely supported, and uniform stalls were successfully hosted at four different events, including the EastSide Arts Festival Fun Day in CS Lewis Square.

RE-GIFT STALL: The Scaffolding Project hosted a Re-Gift stall at the Christmas market in CS Lewis Square as a fundraising activity. The team worked together to source items and hosted a fabulous Christmas gift stall. It was wonderfully supported by many local people and the funds raised will help meet the need of those in crisis throughout the winter months.

and building the haunted walk-through and to Hosford House for not only getting into the spirit of things by dressing up in fabulous costumes but also providing excellent food, drink and entertainment.

Local community groups got involved to help craft and create special goods for a Christmas fair held at the Skainos Centre. There were sweet treats, fresh produce, knitted goods, handmade ornaments, wooden snowmen and more. With over 200 people in attendance the atmosphere was buzzing and bustling. Santa made an appearance collecting the children's Christmas wish lists and giving them a gift.

Walkway Young Mums

Walkway Community Association has been delivering its Young Mums Project to a group of mums and their babies each Thursday morning. The project offers childcare opportunities while the young mums use the time to take part in a range of activities, workshops and courses aimed at reducing isolation, capacity building, enhancing self-confidence and increasing their employability.

The young mums recently participated in an accredited EMS Paediatric First Aid course in which they all passed and received a recognised accreditation. The course resulted in improved health and well-being, increased levels of employability, enhanced confidence and self-esteem and better communication skills for the young mums. The Young Mums Project has had a positive impact on all the participants and has given some of the mums the confidence to enrol in education, gain qualifications and have an overall improved outlook on life.

Kimberley Hewitt, 22 from the Newtownards Rd area who has three young children, commented "The Walkway young mums project has been incredible for my children and myself, emotionally, socially and mentally. It is an incredibly supportive outlet for problems I am facing as a young mother. The group is also giving me the opportunity to build myself up and develop new skills and gain new qualifications."

Row on Row





Local people remembered, included those from all communities, young and old; male and female, regardless of religious persuasion or political allegiance.

This years 'Row on Row' community remembrance event took place in Dr Pitt Memorial Park, Newtownards Road. It involved local communities, groups and individuals honouring the memory of those who served and sacrificed, particularly in the Great War. The project name is derived from a line in John McCrae's poem 'In Flanders Field'.

Over one thousand poppy crosses were planted creating a temporary field of remembrance. There were also several opportunities for individuals to attend the event, including a 'Last Post' ceremony performed in the evening, during which, the profile of a local person that was killed in the war

was read aloud. The profiles included those from all communities, young and old; male and female, regardless of religious persuasion or political allegiance, they were all remembered. However, many of the two thousand five hundred that visited the park during the seven days simply used the poppy installation as a time of quiet reflection.

Local youth and resident groups decorated 3ft high crosses, and these were displayed along the railings of the Park. 'Row on Row' attracted people from all communities, both local residents and visitors to the area. The Polish community not only laid a wreath but also decorated one of the large crosses.
