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### Shared Learning Programme



Community groups across Belfast and Derry-Londonderry are very experienced in developing innovative approaches to social challenges. The Urban Villages Initiative helps local groups and residents across all five Urban Village areas to build connections and share learning on ways to make a difference.

The Colin Allotments and Healthy Living Centre in West Belfast hosted a Shared Learning event in November. This is one of the region's biggest allotments projects and includes a community facility constructed from repurposed shipping containers.

Presentations highlighted ways the Allotments are used to support educational and health outcomes. This includes cooking and horticultural courses for residents and school children. The Public Health Agency and Colin Men's Shed showcased community initiatives promoting mental health.

First time visitors to Colin came away with new contacts and sources of advice to advance similar initiatives in their own areas.

New Year resolutions were very topical at a Health and Wellbeing event in Derry-Londonderry in January. The Shared Learning event at Bishop Street Community Centre highlighted community based approaches to promoting healthy lifestyles.

The work of the Bogside and Brandywell Health Forum showcased school, family-based and workplace approaches to good health. The Pink Ladies Cancer Support Group demonstrated the power of committed people and volunteers to support others. Dove House Community Trust highlighted the importance of financial support and advice services to help people at times of crisis. People also left the event in Derry-Londonderry with a better understanding





of creative techniques to support wellbeing and the delivery of health based approaches.

### Lagmore Community Forum

Colin

WEST BELFAST

The building is already experiencing high demand and is providing a safe space for community groups to deliver vital services.

The new premises for Lagmore Community Forum was officially opened in November last year. Working closely with the local community, the new purpose built £400,000 community facility was made possible by funding from the Urban Villages Initiative and working in partnership with Belfast City Council.

The new building has a high spec fit out and is well equipped to service the local community and provides a welcoming shared space for others booking the venue. Located in the grounds of Christ The Redeemer Church it will be home to the Lagmore Community Forum and will be the organisation's first purpose-built premises since it was founded in 2000.



The building is already experiencing high demand and is providing a safe space for community groups to deliver vital services including Sure Start Parent and Toddler group, Blue Butterfly Stage School, Youth Services and Slimming World to name but a few.

Éamonn Scott, the founding Chairperson of Lagmore Community Forum, said

"Today is a good day for the people of Lagmore, as this building provides a long awaited and much needed facility for our community. As well as providing a base for Lagmore Community Forum, it also creates a safe place for local groups to meet."

### Colin Thriving Youth Project

Colin Glen Trust has had huge numbers of young people accessing the service with as many as 119 young people attending on some evenings. They have taken part in weekly programmes of music, sport and events away from Colin. These sessions have presented opportunities for outreach providers to refer young people off the streets into warm welcoming and engaging programmes.

On average 50-60 young people, mostly between 13-18yrs, attend activities every Friday evening, and very large numbers of younger people attend the alternative youth zone delivery sessions.

Colin Glen Trust has hosted three significant events since the launch of the Thriving Youth Programme, starting with the opening of the Skytrek and Archery evening activity during the Summer months, which proved very popular.

An impressive teen-focused Spooktacular Halloween event especially targeting those in post-primary education was very popular with locals and a group of nearly 60 young people were invited from the EastSide Urban Village area to enjoy the event. The third event was the Urban Villages Winterfest, held over a 3-day period it offered young people from the area activities throughout the holiday period.

The extended opening hours of the Saints Youth Centre has proved to be very successful. The youth centre has been opened an extra hour on a Friday evening (until 11 pm) and a Sunday afternoon (4-7pm). Both these sessions have given the young people a real alternative to hanging around the streets. During the opening times, there has been a visible reduction in the numbers of young people taking part in antisocial behaviour.

Colin Youth Development Centre - The "2 cities 2 walls" Programme is currently being delivered with the Belfast Education visits happening in January 2018, and the Colin Youth Forum set for Berlin in March 2018.

A busy and an exciting few months ahead for our youths in Colin!

"Without this funding support, our building is lying dormant, therefore, using the building and the skills of the staff team we have been able to help meet the needs of our young people better. Our interim evaluations with the young people have helped shape the programme in the months moving forward. This type of feedback ensures that the project continues to be a success."

From the inception of the Thriving Youth Project, there has been a significant increase in positive engagement with young people in the Colin area.

Youth Initiatives are engaging young people in a range of ways, such as detached street work, after-schools football and rugby, dropin's, good relations and personal and social development sessions.

In recent months young people have been engaged on the streets and, incredibly, they have then made the journey to the youth work centre where they are now participating in youth programmes and on accredited courses.

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So far, 436 young people have been engaged through detached youth work, and the plan is to connect and engage with many more through to March 2018.

This project has real impact. Young people have said they are more engaged in their communities, they feel safer, and there is an increase in the use of community services, and overall, they feel their voices are being heard.

Update on the Colin Town Centre Transport Hub

Work is progressing well on the development of the Colin Town Centre Transport Hub and Civic Square with the contractor on target to complete in August for the **opening in September 2018.** 

The new facility will include an integrated community space and a civic square that will have public events alongside a coffee dock, waiting area and public toilets.

The new Transport Hub, which forms a vital part of the Belfast Rapid Transit (BRT) project will be a state of the art facility and will provide a significant economic boost to the local area.







# Removing barriers to learning in Colin

Around 50 primary school children in the Colin area of West Belfast will access vital counselling support this school year thanks to a partnership between the **Urban Villages** Initiative, Colin Neighbourhood Partnership, Barnardo's and local schools.

The Colin Time4Me service, which was commissioned by Colin Neighbourhood Partnership (CNP) and has been delivered since 2013. provides play therapy-based support to children from 6-10 years of age, facing a range of challenges such as family issues, bereavement and anxiety. Nearly 80% of children referred to the service are assessed at the start of counselling as being within the clinical range of stress and demonstrating problem behaviours.

The service is delivered weekly across six Colin primary schools; Our Lady Queen of Peace, Holy Evangelists, Scoil na Fuiseoige, Christ the Redeemer, St. Kieran's and Good Shepherd, Each child receives on average 10 counselling support sessions and there is a significant waiting list. Recently the service was under threat until the Urban Villages Initiative stepped in to provide funding for this project.

One local school Principal said: "I couldn't possibly say enough about the value of the Time4Me programme in this school. Our counsellor provides a service – working with many of our most troubled children and helping them remove barriers to learning - that I don't believe we could do without."

Another Principal said:

greatest initiative in all that
time has been bringing

schools. Counselling works!"
