Principals from both Nursey Schools commented, "The exhibition of the Buddy Up work was a proud moment for everyone in our school community! The exhibition is a fantastic way to share a little of the creativity and hard work that happens in Edenderry and Holy Cross on a daily basis with our parents and families."



The programme was developed by CRIS with these two pioneering Nursery Schools. This is an intergenerational peace building approach that seeks to engage everyone in the school community to play a role in building a shared future.

The Urban Villages Initiative is investing in the growth of this inter-school Buddy system, that will be delivered by CRIS across Primary Schools serving Urban Village areas throughout Belfast and Derry-Londonderry.

# New Creative Learning Fund will support fresh approach in the classroom

The Urban Villages Initiative is working with the Arts Council of Northern Ireland (ACNI) and the Education Authority (EA) to support a new three-year programme to inject more creativity into the classroom, in a bid to improve educational outcomes for students.

The announcement follows a successful pilot scheme rolled out last year in 10 post-primary schools serving Urban Village areas.

The Creative Schools
Partnership is a programme
that was developed, based
on research which indicated
that access to quality arts
experiences in school can
benefit all aspects of learning.

These include better engagement and attendance levels, improving results in other school subjects, increasing confidence and self-motivation, and promoting positive mental health and wellbeing.

The schools will be working with artists on a range of

creative projects including, music production, journalism, photography, film making, animation, and ceramics.

"We were overwhelmed with the positive feedback we had from the schools who took part in last year's pilot programme and are delighted to be working with the Education Authority and the Urban Villages Initiative once again to create a new threeyear programme which will benefit many more children." Roisin McDonough, Chief Executive of ACNI.

**EA Chairperson** Sharon O'Connor said: "The Creative Schools Partnership is making a valuable contribution to our schools. It focuses on creating collaborative opportunities for schools, teachers, artists and communities. The programme enables our young people to bring about real change in how they see and value themselves, as well as understanding how they can make a positive impact in their own community."

Blessed Trinity College in North Belfast was one of the ten schools to take part in the original pilot programme last year.

Gilah McCarroll, Teacher, Blessed Trinity College, said: "We have been working with a group of Key stage 3 students who are now in vear ten. We are so fortunate to also be working with Newington Day Centre which is a centre that caters for the elderly in the heart of North Belfast. Our students have been visiting there, befriending the members, hearing their life stories, interviewing them and then filming them to turn their stories into animations."

Eleven schools serving Urban Village areas have so far been awarded funding to take part in the first phase of the new creative programme.

## Win for Youth Social Action Group



Congratulations to the extraordinary young people from the PGL (Personal Growth through Leadership) youth group on receiving an Outstanding Achievement Award at the Colin Youth Awards 2019.

The Colin Youth Awards, supported by the Urban Villages Initiative and the Education Authority, recognise and celebrate the achievements of young people in schools, sport, creativity and social action, across the Colin Urban Village area.

The PGL youth group are involved in a number of social action activities in the local community including tackling loneliness and isolation for elderly residents of their community who are living in care homes.

They have completed dementia awareness training as a lot of the residents have Alzheimer's

or Dementia and the group are now trained in how to diffuse and reduce anxiety which can be a big part of the emotional state of residents.

The group provide a range of fun activities for the residents and they plan a series of social events throughout the year where residents from the home and the wider community mix in the youth centre, with dinner and entertainment.

These young people have completed OCN accreditation as inclusion champions so they can promote good relations and help to break down barriers inside and outside of the care homes.

Engaging in conversation and social interaction, their work has also greatly helped men living in the care homes who can often become socially withdrawn from people.

The group has also connected with Good Morning Colin and created packs for Christmas hampers and delivered them to elderly residents in the community at Christmas time.

Congratulations to the PGL group and all of the winners on the night, very well deserved awards.









# Footprints Supports Syrian Families in Colin

Footprints Women's
Centre are providing a
supportive and a warm
welcome to Syrian families
living in Colin through its
Syrian Women's programme,
delivered every Thursday
in the centre.

A partnership was established between Footprints and CRAIC NI in September 2018 to support these newcomer families.

Twenty Syrian families take part in the project.
The Footprints Centre provides a safe local space and interpreting services to support women to come together, gather information, meet and socialise with other women in the area.

Nemat Yousfi a participant of Footprints Women's Centre, commented, "I am very happy going to Footprints and seeing Syrian woman. I have made new friends. My English is getting better and I can talk to everyone."

The programme funded by the Urban Villages Initiative is proving a great success with both local Syrian families and other new families moving into the area.

"The women seem to really enjoy coming to the centre, they can relax, they use the social supermarket and they even cook their own food! They have an opportunity to get to know a bit more about our local culture and for us to find out about theirs." said Eileen Wilson, Project Worker, Footprints Women's Centre.

Women participating in the programme also have access to Footprints full range of services which include family support, childcare, empowerment project, community food store, benefit advice, employment support and volunteering opportunities.





# Colin Celebrates Men's Health Month







To celebrate Men's Health Month in June, Colin's Men's Shed organised a wide range of events and activities to raise awareness of health issues that affect men.

During the month, local men could access physical and mental health services including free health tests to check blood pressure, cholesterol and glucose levels, walk and talk sessions, bowel cancer awareness workshop, complementary therapies and acupuncture and mindfulness courses.

commented "Studies
consistently show men are
much less likely to visit a
doctor, or even notice signs
of illness, than women are.
The men's health month
focused on getting men to
become aware of problems
they may have or could
develop, and gain the
courage to do something
about it."

He added "We were also delighted to see an increasing number of men participate in these health awareness sessions this year and we thank the Urban Villages Initiative for their support".

First Graduates of Colin ScortED B. Community Safety OCN CONTRACTOR



Attendees at The Colin Safer Neighbourhood Projects (CSNP) recent AGM, included the Colin areas first graduates of a unique new OCN course, designed to help those involved in the safer neighbourhoods projects to be more aware of Community Safety and Anti-Social Behaviour (ASB) issues in their area.

12 teenagers from Saints and Sally Gardens took part in the unique course at the end of last year.
The course was designed by CSNP in conjunction with Sally Gardens Manager, Martin Connolly and the centres Youth team.

Michael George, Vice Chair of CSNP commented: "The Course is designed to highlight the effects of Anti-Social and low level criminal behaviour on the wider community.

"We wanted it to reflect the concerns of our residents without lecturing to those taking part. Feedback from the young people involved was excellent and what came across strongly, was respect all round is key to reducing the problem.

"We have taken their views on board and vice versa. This is another link in the Colin areas multi agency approach to ASB and it's no coincidence that we have seen a 10% reduction in issues, the best since collation figures started."





The Know It, Change It, Live It (KCL) project by Dove House, supports low income families through financial inclusion, helping to build financial confidence and capacity by money maximisation, spending tips, good budgeting habits and debt advice across the Urban Village area. The KCL project offers support services including debt advice, to local families suffering hardship due to financial abuse. Financial abuse is when people lose money for essential living costs to feed an addiction of a family member.

Majella Stewart, Financial Engagement Officer, Dove House said, "We work with a lady whose partner has a gambling addiction.

Whilst working with her, it became evident that this was impacting greatly on her life and her entire family.

"We supported her through gaining enough confidence to change her pin numbers and we have also supported her partner by signposting him onto Gamblers Anonymous which is offering support to him. Read her story below."

#### My Story: Gaining Financial Confidence

"I came to see if I could get my debts in order and Majella noticed that there was money missing that couldn't be accounted for. I opened up to Majella about my partners gambling, and how much money I was losing per week and how it was impacting on my mental health. We have worked through it with Majella, and we are getting to a much better place

"I have ensured that there is no access to my money for gambling, however we have a long way to go with this issue. I am just so grateful for the support offered by the KCL project and especially for the listening ear that was provided. I will continue to work with the project until I can gain more confidence dealing with my debt issues."

Urban Villages Initiative in FastSide

#### EAST BELFAST

Twice weekly, groups of young mums from different community backgrounds and from across the EastSide Urban Village area, meet in Walkway Community Centre to take part in a range of courses and personal development opportunities.

This yearlong programme overcomes barriers for participation, by providing onsite childcare to enable the young mums to participate fully. It also gives Walkway an opportunity to address many of the needs identified by the mums, such as isolation and marginalisation.

The programme also tackles numerous barriers to learning faced by the mums including, childcare provision, low self-esteem and confidence as well as a lack of awareness of local services, agencies and resources that can support and develop them.



## Resilient Young Mums



Participation enables the young mums to support and learn from each other and from professionals, building confidence and skills to enable them to achieve their goals and to reach their full potential.

Almost a year ago one of the young mums, Lauren, lost her newborn baby, Lottie. Lottie was born very prematurely



and had a number of medical conditions. Tragically she only survived to 14 weeks.

Lauren shared the sadness of her story with the other young mums who in turn provided significant support to Lauren during this sad time. In memory of Lottie, they also decided to fundraise for the Neonatal Unit at Royal Victoria Hospital, where she was treated, by doing the fun run in the recent Belfast Marathon. They subsequently raised over £700 whilst having lots of fun in the process.

## New Street Art in EastSide Urban Gallery

Two new pieces of street art were unveiled by EastSide Partnership this week, as part of the EastSide Urban Gallery project funded by the Urban Villages Initiative. London based street artists have been putting their trademarks on two walls in the heart of east Belfast.

The Urban Gallery project aims to use art and creativity to enhance places and spaces in east Belfast for residents and visitors to enjoy.

Both art pieces are located adjacent to each other on a wall along the Ballymaccarett Walkway section of the Comber Greenway, close to C.S Lewis Square.

The first of the two artworks features a robin amongst trees. This latest nature inspired street art works perfectly in its location on the Comber Greenway. The second piece of artwork

is almost 400 feet long and is an energetic piece of art featuring flowers, bees and her trademark toast!

# New Technology driving Tourism in EastSide









The Augmented Reality (A/R) Project has focused on telling the social, cultural and historical importance of East Belfast and its people within the context of the last 100 years.

The project has been designed to help develop the tourism offering in East Belfast and has helped to generate further interest in the wider tourism offering in the local area. The first two years of the project have focused on developing relationships in the community and developing 'value-added' content using audio, video, A/R and Digital Doors to support the virtual and on-site tourist in their understanding of the EastSide Urban Village area.

The product shares online information about the area

through social media to generate interest, and via embedded e-commerce and Augmented Reality to entice footfall and encourage engagement in the area. Having developed the digital content, this year the focus is to develop engagement with visitors, both local and international tourists to access and enjoy the content created.

Through an upcoming marketing campaign, the project will help further develop tourism in Eastside by bringing virtual and actua tourists into the Urban Village area.

## Inner East Belfast Churches Historical Trail

The Inner East Churches
Network made up of a group
of clergy and lay people
from the Newtownards Road,
managed by East Belfast
Community Development
Agency and supported by the
Urban Villages Initiative. The
Network meets on a monthly
basis to build relationships,
share information and work
together on practical projects
addressing local need.

One project is the development of the Churches

Historical Trail. Churches and faith-based organisations have been, and continue to be, integral to community infrastructure in Inner East Belfast. To celebrate and reflect this heritage 22 churches in the EastSide Urban Village area and wider area of influence have been included in a Churches Historical trail.

The trail will be navigated using a fold-out map which highlights key buildings and

identifies significant facts and historical achievements associated with the churches.

The trail also sets the scene by placing the development of religious life in Inner East Belfast within the wider context of urban expansion, as men and women began to move from the countryside to take up jobs in the factories, mills, shipyards and service industries of this busy district.

between generations in order
to understand what shaped
the communities we all live
in, how to ensure that we
secure a better future for
all and how best to achieve
that together".

Thomas Turley of Ardoyne Youth Club commented:

"Consultation with young people is at the core of all youth work, be that around services and needs, or on how young people can help change a society coming out of conflict. Youth services and young people are key to peace-building, and we look forward to engaging with all agencies to ensure that young people are at the heart of these discussions".

This event is part of Ardoyne Youth Enterprise's AYE Matter series, supported by the Urban Villages Initiative. Linsey Farrell, Director of the Urban Villages Initiative, said: "The Urban Villages Initiative is committed to listening to the community voice and listening to young voices is a crucial part of that, giving young people the opportunity to contribute towards shaping their future."

## Youth Access

Working together to deliver first class counselling for young people...



Two North Belfast counselling groups have pooled their resources together to address growing waiting lists of 11 to 24 year olds in need of counselling.

New Life Counselling and Jigsaw have identified mental health themes that are common to young people and have developed group support sessions to explore these issues. The sessions cover mental health tips, stress management, use of drama, art and mindfulness techniques. Young people can access one-to-one counselling through self-referral. The programme also includes outreach in local youth centres.

The project has already made a difference. Jigsaw CEO, Carol Massey reports that her waiting times for young people in need of counselling have reduced. New Life has seen an increase in young people referring to its services and completing an intervention.

"I learned that life was worth living, how to cope with hard times and that talking is OK." Jigsaw participant 'Now I am not worrying as much, I have learnt new techniques to calm myself down."

#### BIG Improvements in Reading Age

Reading Partners
- improving children's
reading age by up
to two years!

Many children in the Ballysillan and Ardoyne area do not achieve their full potential in reading. This can lead to educational under-achievement across all areas of the curriculum at primary and secondary level. This programme has shown improvement for children of up to two years for some children.

The Reading Partners programme was created to support the 'middle reading' group, as other initiatives typically deal with reading recovery and support for children with special learning needs.

Reading Partners is delivered on a crosscommunity basis by Jigsaw Community Counselling.

The Reading Partners, parents and children take part in 10week programmes together. These involve three one-to-one reading sessions each week aimed at making the child a more accomplished and confident reader, and giving the parent tips to support the child's reading at home.

Over this 2018/19 school year, 150 children have taken part, with 15 Reading Partners, both in school and with their parents at home.

The success of this project is evident as assessments of reading ability so far have shown an improved reading age of between three months and two years for each child.



PWC recently sponsored a 'Big Day' event at Belfast South Community Resources in the South Belfast Urban Village area. The focus was on mental health awareness and building confidence. It was a collective effort involving statutory agencies, community groups and schools. The Urban Villages Initiative funded the transport which brought the young people together.

When it comes to young lives, the move from primary school to secondary school is a very significant event. It is a time of change and upheaval. With that, can come anxiety and uncertainty.

A project run by Belfast South Community Resources (BSCR) in the South Belfast Urban Village area is helping local children prepare for the 'big move' in September.

The Urban Villages Initiative also supports a range of programmes for primary aged children, revision classes for older students; as well as the Growing South Digital programme, providing innovative ways to access

digital activities and facilities.

Primary 7 pupils from
Blythefield PS and St
Malachy's PS gathered in
the Sandy Row BSCR building
- which was funded by the
Social Investment Fund (SIF)
- and hosted mindfulness,
yoga and computer coding
sessions for the children.

Sinead Magee from St Malachy's explained it gives the children an opportunity to learn new skills, while meeting their counterparts from another school with a different background but the same need for support.

"Going from primary to secondary school is a big change," she said. "You spend seven years in the same environment with the same people, and suddenly it's all different that can be daunting."

The whole idea of being ready and prepared to move on is fairly new. However, building resilience to help with this, and wider life, is a progressive move.

Lynsey Patton from Blythefield PS added: "Initiatives such as this help to support the work we are doing in school around the transition, and gives us access to services which we can't provide in the classroom. You can see the children are very engaged in the activities, and the impact today will have is very positive."

The children made t-shirts with positive affirmations about themselves, such as 'I am confident' and 'I am energetic'.

While the techniques the young people were shown focussed on helping them when they change schools, they can have a wider, and longer lasting, impact.

Nikki Johnston, the Education Manager at BSCR, said: "I have had children come back and say the relaxation and mindfulness techniques they learned have helped them months and years afterwards."

In the afternoon, women's groups from the Urban Village area came together to learn the same skills.

"Hopefully, the tools people learn today will stay with them. Ultimately, we want to build on this and offer more in-depth sessions for the entire community. But today is about giving them a taster and planting a positive seed."

### Supporting Parents to Help their Children



Sharon Morrison is the Joint Parent Worker in Blythefield Primary School and Arellian Nursery School, both in Sandy Row. Sharon's role is supported by the Urban Villages Initiative and she splits her time working with parents from both schools.

In her role she works with parents to help them support their children to get the most out of their school experience.

Parents are empowered through developing relationships with each other, building capacity, learning life-skills and enhancing parenting skills. Sharon helps build relationships with teaching staff, making strong connections between the parents and the school.

"I get on well with all the parents I give advice to, and although I am not a teacher, I am a parent, and I think bringing that perspective helps. Some parents struggle with the pressures of parenting, they often didn't have a positive role model in their lives, which is where I provide advice and encouragement."

Sharon identifies training opportunities for the parents and has linked up with local organisations such as BSCR and GEMS to provide courses, bringing parents from both schools together to learn.

The parents have also participated in a series of development opportunities such as sewing classes, parenting classes, cookery classes, paediatric first aid courses and anger management courses.

The classes bring people together who may not normally have the opportunity to come together and friendships are formed outside of the classes. Newcomer families are welcomed and benefit from getting to know other parents, often in similar situations to themselves.

## Sólás Kids Support Den Breaking Down Barriers





Sólás is a Charity dedicated to supporting children and young people with additional needs. It is based in South Belfast and has a very strong volunteering ethos.

Founded in 2009, it provides a range of educational and social programmes for children and young people with additional needs and/or Autism.

The Urban Villages Initiative funds Sólás's Kids Support Den which operates weekly from Monday to Thursday, providing two separate after school support sessions each afternoon for children of primary school age.

Sólás have supported almost 40 children of primary school age from the South Belfast Urban Village area, who receive one to one support in literacy, phonics and learning as part of the Kids Den programme. At the start of the support programme, each participant was assessed against the following criteria; Reading Ability, Communication with Tutor, Confidence, Teamwork, Communication with Peers, and Emotional Behaviour.

The assessments were revisited at the end of the last quarter and found that over 90% of the children attending recorded positive improvements, in at least 4 of the measures.

Children attending the Kids Den come from a range of schools in the South Belfast Urban Village area and area of influence, including, St Malachys PS, Botanic PS and Scoil an Droichid.

Operating four afternoons/ week from Apsley Hall in Donegall Pass. Sólás also deliver a number of parents' programmes, supporting the information needs of parents with children with additional needs.

It has created new office space and more flexible meeting & activity rooms for different events and audiences. Also, a new entrance has been created which allows for disability access.
