Members have already moved into the recently opened Destined renovation project, which has provided accessible accommodation in the old Foyle Valley Railway Museum. This project has also provided opportunity for Destined members to train as visitor hosts in the station, establishing a social enterprise.

Following a very successful TEDxStomont Youth programme earlier this year, we are currently supporting women of all ages across Urban Village areas to have the opportunity of training with the professional TED team, with the possibility, if they so choose, to pitch for a chance to present on the TEDxStormont Women's stage in the Great Hall, Stormont on the 12th December this year.

'The Arts Help Change our Way of Thinking'



St Colm's High School in Colin recently took part in the Creative Schools Partnership, giving young people access to quality arts experiences and fostering creativity while supporting the educational and personal needs of pupils.

The Art and English departments worked with year 8 pupils and their parents to promote positive mental well-being. The focus of the project was to produce a public art piece in the form of an exterior ceramic dove mural, to be placed on the front of the school building.

Supported by celebrated artist Annemarie Robinson, the pupils, parents and staff fired and glazed their own dove and then inscribed it with phrases of hope that had been taken from the poetry produced in School.

The English department also facilitated an information session and coffee morning for parents, out of which arose the need for parental support around the issue of young people's mental health.

Gina McDonald, a senior Education Authority (EA) youth worker, met with parents and a support programme was set up to explore issues, such as self-harm, how to have the difficult conversations with young people and signposting of services.

The compilation of poetry on the issue of mental health will be integrated into the work of the English Department, and there are plans to publish an anthology at the end of this current school year. Extracts of the poetry are on the hoarding at the new park in Colin site along with photography by year 11 pupils.

The project has left an important legacy in the artwork and the monthly coffee mornings continue to support the parents.

This project is supported by the Arts Council of Northern Ireland, the Education Authority (EA) and the Urban Villages Initiative and involves thirteen post-primary schools across Urban Village areas.

14 more schools celebrate becoming 'Schools of Sanctuary'

During Good Relations Week in September this year, 14 more schools from across Urban Village areas have been recognised as Schools of Sanctuary. Pupils, teachers and communities have worked together to inspire and bring about change in their local areas.

The school community has shown its commitment to making their schools' welcoming and inclusive spaces for everyone. Pupils have developed cultural awareness across the curriculum, and strengthened connections with the wider community.

Caoimhín Mac Uilliam, Principal, Scoil na Fuiseoige commented, 'The Schools of Sanctuary programme helps the children to become more culturally aware. It helps them to understand others and themselves and helps them to become happy and more contented learners. This is only the beginning. A seed has been planted and we are looking forward to continuing our School of Sanctuary journey.'

There are now a total of 28 Schools of Sanctuary serving Urban Village areas. The Education Authority's Intercultural Education Service (IES) works in partnership with the Urban Villages Initiative and collaboratively with the City of Sanctuary, providing training and support to help the schools achieve the award.

Israel Eguaogie, Chair of Belfast City of Sanctuary said "Our teams of monitors have been most impressed by the great work that is being done in



schools to welcome and adapt to the growing diversity of our city and promote the positive inclusion of all including newcomer communities."

NEW BUDDY UP PROJECT

Urban Villages is partnering with the Community Relations in Schools (CRIS) Buddy Up programme, building on the School of Sanctuary approach bringing pupils and families together to build new friendships and help local communities better understand each other's culture and the everyday things that connect them.

New graduates in Social Enterprise

Ten people from community groups and social enterprises in Urban Village areas have graduated from Ulster University with an Advanced Diploma in Social Enterprise.

They were supported on the TRANSFORM Social Enterprise Development Programme with funding from Flax Trust and the Urban Villages Initiative. The collaboration includes Ulster University Business School and the School for Social Enterprises in Ireland.

The innovative programme enables individuals to gain the knowledge and skills to start or grow a social enterprise – these deliver goods and services like any other business but are driven by a social purpose and reinvest profits to support these goals.

The course content includes master-classes from business leaders and social innovators and best practice study visits. The qualification, insight and networks gained by the graduates will help local groups achieve their goals and support the communities they serve.

Growing Spaces -Encourages Children to Lead a Healthier Lifestyle

Hundreds of local school children have successfully completed The Growing Spaces Programme at Colin Glen Allotments in Poleglass.

Now in its 4th year the programme enables school children to learn about how food is grown, understand where the fruit and vegetables they eat come from and provide them with the confidence to make healthy eating decisions.

During the programme school children are taught how to plant and care for a variety of vegetables and they are encouraged to lead a healthier lifestyle. The children also use the horticultural produce to make a range of dishes including potato and tomato salads, coleslaw, kale chips and guacamole.

Matthew McKinley, Colin Allotments Healthy Living Manager, commented "Health experts have warned that children in the UK exceed the maximum recommended sugar intake for an 18-year-old by the time they are 10. Half of the sugar is coming from sugary drinks, sweets, biscuits, cakes, puddings, sugary breakfast cereals and higher-sugar yoghurts and puddings."

"It is vital to teach children at a young age to make healthier eating choices. This programme focuses on increasing intake of fruit and vegetables and discouraging intake of food high in sugar to help guide children on a path to long term health in adulthood."




Historical and Tourism Forum for Colin to be Formed

Colin Community Walk and Talk to Support Suicide Prevention

The Colin Community took to the streets on World Suicide Prevention Day to raise awareness about suicide and its prevention in the wider community.

The "Walk & Talk" event organised by Colin Neighbourhood Partnership was routed from the new Colin Town Square along the Stewartstown Road. The local community was invited to join the walk for any amount of time from 5 mins to an hour.

Local groups attending included the essential services, local schools and sports clubs. Everyone wore a high visibility vest displaying the lifeline crisis response helpline service number 0800 808 8000 with the key message of 'just talk'.



Lord Mayor John Finucane also attended and support groups were available on the day to offer support and guidance.

Annie Armstrong, Manager Colin Neighbourhood Partnership, commented: "The theme this year was working together to prevent suicide. This walk was organised to encourage people to talk about and share their problems. People need to know that someone is listening and if they or someone they love is in distress, that it's ok to ask for help and help is available, and that it is also ok not to be ok".



Building Your Future Employability Project

Recruitment for year 2 of the Building Your Future Project has been a huge success to date. Here at Poleglass Community Association, we provide outstanding support and guidance to unemployed and economically inactive participants, who live within the Colin Urban Village area.

We continue to support participants to tackle their educational, employment and emotional needs. A training calendar has been produced to offer a range of workshops and level one Vocational Skills training to enhance educational attainment, confidence and motivation.

A number of local residents have recently completed a level 1 qualification in Make Up Application where they learnt both practical and theoretical skills for applying make-up competently. Several participants are planning to run their own business and are progressing to our Social Enterprise Academy.

In addition, participants are currently completing units in confidence and self-esteem, improving assertiveness, good relations and interpersonal skills for the individual.

A lot of participants have already overcome employment barriers and are planning their goals for the future. One way of doing this is through visualisation boards and one to one mentoring.

A group of participants have also completed Construction and CSR training and significantly they have gained employment.

Bringing the Streets Alive

The Streets Alive project is an annual programme of events in Derry~Londonderry that aims to build connectivity and develop relationships between communities in the Bogside, Bishop Street and Fountain areas.

Over the summer months, the streets have been alive with some of the best known cultural and community events in Derry~Londonderry, they continue to attract higher levels of attendance from across the city and also visitors to the area.

The unique aspect of Streets Alive is that it supports extending these well recognised events and activities into the venues and streets of the Fountain. **Bogside and Bishop St Urban** Village area; connecting with community directly and involving them in development of creative and inviting engagement ideas. This has generated increased use of shared space and ease of transition, creating more welcoming spaces accross the Urban Village area.

Festival of Fire

Working together, sixteen partner organisations produced a spectacular performance of fire and music as the finale to the 27th Annual Gasyard Feilé. The Festival of Fire, in its new location on the Faughan Street embankment (the banking), continues to develop a family friendly option as an alternative to the unregulated bonfire that occurs in the area.

A number of original acts performed at the festival stage before a fireworks display, attracting over 4,000 people from across the city as well as tourists and visitors to the area. The fire procession included many of the young people and volunteers from a range of local community organisations who were involved in planning the event.



Jog in the Bog

This year, Jog in the Bog had over 500 runners and saw spectators lining the street to cheer them on, before returning to the Gasyard Centre for the winner's presentations and family fun activities.

More children than ever took part in this year's event with many running alongside their parents. The event is now well established in the city's sporting calendar and continues to attract more participants each year.

As well as bringing people together from diverse community backgrounds to take part in the run, Jog in the Bog provides an opportunity for people to improve their

mental health and wellbeing by getting active. Local mental health groups attended the event to raise awareness of mental health and to advise people about the services they offer the local community.



Celtronic Kids

Over 4,500 music fans converged on Derry-Londonderry for the 19th edition of Ireland's leading electronic music festival, Celtronic 2019. As part of the festival, Streets Alive collaborated with Celtronic to produce Celtronic Kids at Long Tower Community Centre in June.

Celtronic Kids is an electronic music event for children up to the age of 4 and features a full-scale festival style production with state-of-the-art lighting, sound and visual projections. The event was a huge success and was attended by 300 children from across the Urban Village area with their parents/guardians.



Streets Alive Older People's Events

A summer bus trip was organised in partnership with the Bogside & Brandywell Health Forum for seniors from the Urban Village area. The provision of this type of event helps keep people connected to and across their communities giving them the opportunity to meet new friends and participate in community events.

Being connected and keeping active are vital to improving our physical, mental and emotional wellbeing. This engagement helped identify other health & wellbeing issues and people were given advice on community organisations providing a range of cultural, health and environment services for local older people.

Alley Project at Chadolly Street





A group from Hosford Homeless shelter and local residents participated in the Alley Project at Chadolly Street/St. Leonards Crescent, facilitated by Hosford, East Belfast Mission.

A series of workshops looked at memories of local entries in the area and participants designed a mural with local artist Dee Craig.

The alley received a deep clean and the project was launched with a celebration lunch in Skainos and a Horticulture skills session with Belfast in Bloom. Each resident received a hanging basket and this has encouraged several residents to start growing in their back yards.

The group activity reduced social isolation and improved physical and mental health. Local residents that volunteered talked of having a sense of pride in their community. The programme built cohesion across the community by working better together and creating thriving attractive places.

Participants that volunteered during the project felt the benefit and local residents who didn't have the time to get involved with the project saw improvement as the area was cleaned up so well and they received a hanging basket.





Myth Busting and the Realities of Poverty



The Scaffolding Project co-ordinates the collaborative work of community and voluntary organisations who want to reduce the impact of poverty in East Belfast.

'Myth busting and the Realities of Poverty' was the theme of the Scaffolding project conference hosted in March this year. The conference raised awareness, addressed myths and encouraged action.

Two thought provoking films 'I Daniel Blake' and 'A Northern Soul' were screened in the run up to the conference to highlight some of the big issues linked to poverty such as the Social Security and In-work poverty.

People from the community and private sector, businesses and churches attended the conference. Current statistics presented indicated the level of poverty in the local



community and considered the many causes and influencing – factors. Delegates participated in roundtable discussions about the issues presented.

The voices of local people were clearly communicated through video, life stories and poem, which powerfully communicated personal experiences.



The #notjustforboys programme will connect girls with a wide range of exciting career pathways, enhancing their lifetime opportunities and at the same time meet the needs of employers across the wider construction industry."



The project offers girls of all ages support to access work experience, work placements and apprenticeships, aiming to challenge misconceptions and to encourage women to consider wider career choices.

The uptake of apprenticeships is so low amongst girls in trades like construction and engineering, this programme will encourage and practically upskill girls to consider these fantastic career opportunities.

Project participant Charlotte says: "I learned how to use new equipment that I have never used before. I learned new skills and it has shown me new job options."

A Model for the City

The Care Zone Community Health Project

The Care Zone report launch at Belfast City Hall in October was an important milestone in the search for new community - led methods to address health inequalities in the city.

Two years ago, voluntary and statutory agencies started Care Zone in response to the high suicide rate and poor life expectancy in the Oldpark/Cliftonville district, one of the areas of highest deprivation in Northern Ireland.

At the launch, representatives of Lighthouse, Youth Education Health Advice (YEHA), Public Health Agency, the Chief Medical Officer and Lord Mayor spoke of the Care Zone



approach - to put residents at the heart of identifying need and solutions.

But the stars of the day were community champions Tami Russell, Mickey Meehan and Cecilia McCloskey who brought to life the human stories behind the initiative and urged all involved to work harder to bring hope to the community.

Care Zone have carried out community consultations, organised events to promote hope, and to encourage people to reach out for help. They have conducted research

in causes of ill health, developed a local history project and trained community champions to gather local people's views.

With support from the Urban Villages Initiative, youth organisations YEHA and Streetbeat extended the programme by developing the highly successful Care Zone in Schools project in Mercy College and Girls Model, training students as peer mental health advocates. This project is now being rolled out in all senior schools in the North Belfast Urban Village area.



Talk Like TED

Rebecca participated in a Talk Like TED programme supported by the Urban Villages Initiative. It served as an opportunity for us all to remind ourselves that regardless of how we're designated by others, we face many of the same issues and have shared ideas on how to make the place we call home better for our generation and the ones that will follow."

In my role, which is funded by the Urban Villages Initiative, I work with children up to the age of 4 and their families from Sandy Row, Donegall Pass and the Markets.

The main focus of my role is to promote good relations throughout the South Belfast Urban Village area, which entails recognising and celebrating the diverse range of cultures within the city. For example, our popular Diwali celebration recognises the important contribution of the Indian community to life in South Belfast. It's a chance for families to come together to enjoy music, arts and food. The event last year, held in Sandy Row Community Centre was supported by Arts Ekta who brought traditional Indian dress, and arts and crafts, for the children.

"In July 2019, we held a 'Small World' workshop in Donegall Pass, which provided a forum for people to learn about the lives of refugees who are now living in Belfast. It provided an interesting insight into other cultures and the difficulties people have in seeking asylum in Northern Ireland." said Anna Devlin

Working with my wonderful assistants Zainab and Maria, we have been able to establish two additional weekly crèches. This has helped reduce the waiting list and ensures that

more children are accessing vital early year's services.

The provision of these services and range of activities have resulted in a better understanding of other cultures and backgrounds which has improved good relations in the area.





Alternative Therapies in Donegall Pass

URBAN URBAN VILLAGES VILLAGIVE &

Donegall Pass Community Forum (DPCF) continues to provide training for people from the Urban Village area in body massage treatments with the aim of guiding participants into employment.

The VTCT Level 3 Certificate in Swedish massage is a recognised qualification and equips trainees with a range of technical skills and a sound knowledge of health and safety, client care and communication.

Now in its third year, the programme is hugely popular both with residents who avail of the training opportunity and those who use the service for relieving stress.

The therapy team has recently welcomed four new therapists who successfully completed their training, enabling DPCF to provide extra therapies up to four days a week, with both day and evening appointments available to residents in Donegall Pass, Sandy Row and the Markets.

Benview Community Centre

The refurbishment of Benview Community Centre has upgraded internal and external facilities, including modernised common areas and the replacement of an existing MUGA surface.

These improvements provide a safe, welcoming and more inclusive environment in which to facilitate building of inter-generational and more diverse relationships across communities through the provision of wide ranging programmes and services.

This capital project was funded by the Urban Villages Initiative through a £157k investment and was delivered by Belfast City Council.







Sandy Row Play Park

Sandy Row Play Park has had an extensive upgrade of the existing multi-use games area with an attractive play space and all new play equipment.

This is a shared space to bring people and communities together, providing opportunities for children and young people to mix in a safe accessible space in the local area.



This capital project was funded by the Urban Villages Initiative through a £244k investment and was delivered by Belfast City Council.

Orchard Café @ The Foundry

The Orchard Café @ The Foundry has created a new shared space that offers a range of training and development opportunities for local marginalised young people in a real catering business environment.

The café will be operated by Orchardville, a registered charity and social enterprise committed to changing lives by offering opportunities to learn catering and hospitality skills that will enhance employment prospects.

This capital project was funded by the Urban Villages Initiative with a £246k investment and was delivered by Belfast City Council.





Diamond Health Club

The Diamond Health Club has seen the development of a functional, modern, adaptable space for community events, a community gym and bicycle workshop space.

Rejuvenating a vacant site this innovative project provides much needed shared space to bring people together through a varied programme of activities; and in doing so helps further develop community relations in the wider EastSide Urban Village area.

This capital project was funded by the Urban Villages Initiative through a £241k investment and was delivered by Belfast City Council.





Destined

The high standard refurbishment of the existing Foyle Valley Railway Museum building has created a welcoming and inviting place for Destined members, their families and visitors, and it provides DDA compliant accessible working space.

The refurbishment upgrade has improved access for people of all abilities.

The project complements a larger Lottery funded new build for Destined adjacent to this site.
Together they provide essential accommodation and facilities for development opportunities for members, including social enterprise projects. This partnership integrated approach is building community capacity and fostering positive community identity.



The Urban Villages Initiative has invested over £100,000 in renovating the Foyle Valley Railway Museum into an accessible hub.



Ligoniel Primary School

A community hub inside the school and a new build unit for mixed use activities in the school grounds have been developed in Ligoniel Primary School.

These facilities will help to deliver the school's programme

of community projects, continuing the emphasis on encouraging parents to get involved with each other and in the education of their children, as well as for the wider community to engage with the school.

The new accommodation will provide safe, welcoming shared learning and activity space for parents, children





and the community to meet and build relationships across community and cultures.

This capital project was funded by the Urban Villages Initiative through a £166k investment and was delivered by the Education Authority.
