Foreword

I have pleasure in submitting the Roads 2024/25 Annual Report on the work of the Department for Infrastructure (DfI) Roads across the Newry, Mourne and Down District Council area.

This report deals with works completed across the Council area during the year 2023/24 and sets out our initial proposals for schemes to be undertaken in the year 2024/25.

The road network is Northern Ireland's largest and most valuable strategic infrastructure asset. Getting infrastructure right - and investing in it – can and will deliver real benefits for our citizens, our communities and the economy. It delivers for people every day by providing and maintaining the things we all need to go about our daily lives, and which make this place work. While recognising there is much more to do as we seek to improve and protect the vital asset that is our road network, we are working hard to maximise the positive impacts we can deliver with the resources we have.

The budget allocated to the Department for 2024-25 is challenging, however we continue to, prioritise essential frontline services and address regional imbalance. In June 2024 the Department launched its 'Budget 2024-25 Equality Impact Assessment (EQIA) Consultation' to facilitate a thorough assessment of the equality impacts of the 2024-25 opening resource and capital budgets allocated to the Department. An interim report has been published on the findings from the consultation and can be viewed at: Dfl Budget 2024-25 Equality Impact Assessment - Interim Consultation Report (infrastructure-ni.gov.uk)

The opening Capital budget for structural maintenance of the road network in 2024/25 is £89m, which will enable the delivery of the highest priority resurfacing, roadside stability and drainage projects. Further details of those projects to be delivered within the Newry, Mourne and Down District Council area are contained within this report.

For many years, the Department has operated within a constrained Resource budget and has continued to prioritise key essential services.

This means that the Department will continue with a Limited Service policy for routine maintenance activities such as defect repair, grass cutting and gully emptying. The Limited Service policy allows the Department to repair defects greater than 50mm on all roads including low trafficked rural roads and on high trafficked roads, defects greater than 20mm will also be repaired, subject to available resources. The Department will aim to cut all roadside verges and sightline grass at least twice between April and October on the more heavily trafficked roads and once a year on other roads, when it is safe to do so. This aims to balance the need for road safety while protecting our environment and encouraging biodiversity. However, sightlines at bends and junctions will be cut as frequently as required to ensure public safety.

At present a full street lighting repair service continues during 2024/25.

The Division is continuing to face significant staffing pressures which is impacting on our ability to deliver and as such public safety is our paramount priority, and as a result it may mean other

functions will be lower in our priorities. In an effort to maximise our effectiveness I would strongly encourage Councillors who have access to the internet to please report road defects using the DfI online reporting facility provided by NIDirect. Operational teams are of course available to assist with emergency and public safety related queries and can be contacted using our generic email addresses or by phone using our emergency numbers shown on Pages 58 and 59.

The Department recognises that investing in pedestrian and cycling infrastructure can help make our streets feel safer and more accessible for the many people who want greater choice in how they travel, particularly for shorter everyday journeys. It can also help to reduce air pollution and tackle climate change, particularly in combination with public transport.

We are developing a Northern Ireland wide Active Travel Delivery Plan that includes an update of our policies and design guidance for Active Travel as well as network plans for our larger towns and cities. We aim to consult the public on this plan later in 2024. When complete, the Active Travel Delivery Plan will complement the Belfast Cycling Network Delivery Plan and the Strategic Plan for Greenways to provide a firm basis for the prioritisation, design, and delivery of active travel across the north.

The Department continues to work closely with Councils to better understand your five-year active travel programme and to develop an effective grant and support framework for the effective delivery of greenways and other measures to promote and encourage active travel.

Regarding Major Projects in the Council area, the publication of the prioritised list of major road schemes includes the Newry Southern Relief Road and explains that development work on the Ballynahinch Bypass is currently paused. A decision on the schemes within this list will be considered following confirmation of the Department's Transport Plans and the availability of funding. Development work on the Newry Southern Relief Road will continue to progress towards the next key decision regarding publication of draft Orders later in 2024.

In July, the Infrastructure Minister, John O'Dowd MLA announced in the NI Assembly that the A1 upgrade scheme will now proceed to the procurement stage. Work is ongoing to finalise the Business Case and complete the preparation of the contract documents. Further progression of the A1J2 scheme to procurement and subsequent construction will depend on the approval of the Business Case, clearing the remaining statutory procedures and funding being made available to the Department.

I hope that you find this report informative. I, along with a representative from one of our Section Offices, Stephen Duffy and Bronagh Gillespie look forward to meeting the Council.

About Southern Division

Southern Division is one of four Divisions within Dfl Roads. It spans the local Council areas of Armagh City, Banbridge and Craigavon; Newry Mourne and Down; and Newry, Mourne and Down Council Areas (see map below).



In Southern Division we are responsible for approximately 8000km of public road together with 1275 bridges, 121 signalised junctions, 183 stand alone signalised pedestrian controlled crossings, approximately 83,000 streetlights and over 650 illuminated signs and bollards. We carry out functions under the headings:

- Major Projects South Major capital projects (>£5M) on Key Transport Links.
- Road Maintenance Maintenance of the existing network. Maintenance activities include resurfacing, surface dressing and drainage works as well as grass cutting, gully emptying, patching, embankment/verge maintenance, fencing and provision of the Winter Service.
- Road Development Improvements to the existing network to improve safety and traffic progression including Minor Works and Local Transport & Safety Measures.
- Road Planning Regulation of additions to the network proposed by developers.

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1.1 Development Control

Planning Applications

In carrying out their planning functions Councils have a duty to consult a range of statutory bodies. Dfl Roads on behalf of the Department for Infrastructure has entered into an agreement with each Council to provide views and advice on roads and transportation related issues.

DfI Roads in its consideration of planning applications, takes into account aspects of development which could prejudice traffic progression and safety in terms of junction capacity, access arrangements, parking standards and provision, road width, radii, gradients, drainage and sight lines. This consideration usually involves site visits and technical work. Compliance with transport policy and compatibility with road infrastructure is taken into account as well as any need for developer led improvements. Proposals are also checked for potential encroachment upon any future road lines. A detailed Transport Assessment may be required for larger developments where potential traffic impact may extend to road junctions some distance from the development site and where infrastructure improvements are deemed necessary as mitigation. For smaller developments a Transport Assessment Form is required to be completed by the applicant in order to ascertain the likely impact.

In the case of housing developments, the Private Streets (NI) Order 1980 is applied if a planning application includes streets which are to become public and maintainable by the Department. Development Control along with the associated Private Streets team determines the area to be adopted, arranges for the calculation of the bond amount, supervises construction of the streets and, following satisfactory completion by the developer, complete the process for adoption into the public road network. Should the developer not complete the street, Dfl Roads can take appropriate enforcement action under the Private Streets Order to ensure satisfactory completion of works funded by the bond.

Other Development Control work includes participating in pre-application discussions and planning meetings, preparation of evidence and presentation of this at Planning Appeals. Assistance is given with enforcement cases associated with breaches of planning control. Input is provided for the use of planning case officers at Council Planning Committee meetings with attendance by Development Control Officers as required.

Please see Table 1, which shows all consultations our Development Control dealt with during the reporting period from 1 April 2023 to 31 March 2024 within the Newry, Mourne and Down District Council Area.

Of the above, 39 were housing developments involving the Private Streets (NI) Order 1980. Creating approximately 4.2km of new road and 1.1km of new footway.

Roads (NI) Order 1993, Article 80

Article 80 applies to new vehicular accesses or agricultural accesses onto unclassified roads. It covers proposals such as new driveway entrances or alterations where planning permission is not required. During the reporting period Dfl Roads dealt with **26** Article 80 applications.

Development Control also provides evidence in respect of associated Article 84 appeals which are determined by the Planning Appeals Commission.

Development Control also gives advice on various ad-hoc matters such as placing of planters and signage.

During the reporting period Private Streets Section has been successful in adopting a total of **7** private developments comprising **483** metres of carriageway and **20** metres footway into the publicly maintained road network.

1.3 Private Streets - Enforcement

Private Streets Section continues to invoke enforcement proceedings against developers who fail in their responsibility to provide road bonds before commencement of work on site. This takes the form of a series of warning letters followed, if necessary, by enforcement action.

Private Streets Section continues to work with developers on backlog housing sites with the objective of having work completed to an adoptable standard. Where it becomes evident that a developer is either no longer trading or is incapable or unwilling to complete the work, Dfl Roads will consider initiating enforcement action. This may result in the need for Dfl Roads to complete the works and recover the costs from the road bond under Articles 13 and 15 of the Private Streets Order 1980.

There is currently no enforcement action planned for the coming year.

Property Certificates

Private Streets Section coordinates the Dfl Roads response to Property Certificate Enquiries. A total of **8132** Property Certificate Enquiries were processed during the reporting period in Southern Division.

1.5 Street Lighting

The total number of streetlights in Southern Division is approximately 83,000, of which 26,000 (31%) are in the Newry Mourne and Down Council area.

Upgrading of existing street lighting to LED Lanterns

The LED retro fit programme is continuing across the Division. The intention is to reduce energy and maintenance costs by replacing old SOX and SON Lanterns. These are expensive to maintain and the ability to replace parts is diminishing as the production of these parts are being run down. Our target of replacing 3474 SOX and SON lanterns with modern LED lanterns in the council area has been met.

Street Lighting Maintenance

Since April 2015, in line with reductions in available staff, DfI Roads only repairs those defective streetlights reported by the public or their representatives. In order to facilitate this process, reports of defective lights can now be made directly online via the NI Direct website at the web address: https://www.nidirect.gov.uk/services/report-street-light-fault

Reports made via this web page automatically generate a works order to the appropriate contractor to have the defect repaired.

Reports can also be made by telephone at 0300 200 7899.

Priority is given to emergency defects i.e. those defects posing a direct structural or electrical hazard, then to groups of lights out, groups of lights burning continuously and finally to individual lights out.

Repair of faults to streetlights

Our response times are: -

Emergency, responded to a Road Traffic Collision within an hour and a half to site (1.5hrs) where a streetlighting column has been damaged. This is only to make safe and protect the public from danger to exposure of live cables or the column falling down.

Urgent, respond within twenty-four hours (24hrs). This is to reinstate a knockdown of a column possibly at a critical junction.

Normal lamp maintenance within five days (5 days). It is not always possible to fulfil the 5 day response. This can be down to a combination of factors. The number of outages on the system, cable faults on the cable network or staff shortages. We also try to ensure that at least 95% of streetlights are recorded as working on the LMS at anytime, subject to budget being available.

LOCAL TRANSPORT AND SAFETY MEASURES

The Regional Transportation Strategy (RTS) identified the importance of Local Transport and Safety Measures (LTSM) and highlighted some of the principal initiatives to be addressed, including:

- local improvements in towns across the North to assist pedestrians and cyclists.
- local highway infrastructure measures to improve safety, such as collision remedial schemes and traffic calming schemes; and
- Network Development schemes (minor works).

LTSM expenditure tends to be widely spread and most communities benefit, as an individual scheme is relatively low cost in comparison to the cost of projects on the Strategic Works programme. They are usually very visible measures and provide good value for money in terms of a safer road transport system, which benefits society, the economy, the environment; and actively contributes to everyone's quality of life.

- Traffic Calming
- Collision Remedial
- Safer Routes to School
- Bus Priority Measures

<u>Accessible Parking Bays – General</u>

Individual Accessible Parking Bay applications will be assessed before the completion of the necessary legislative process. Successful applications are required to be notified in local newspapers offering the opportunity for the public to submit their views.

Any objections must be fully considered before the application can progress to the Legislative Stage. Due to the processes involved, approved applications are required to be grouped and processed in batches of two or maybe three occasions during the year.

Deillumination of signs

The Department is continuing to develop a programme of replacing internally illuminated bollards with retroreflective boards, as resources permit, thus helping to reduce energy costs.

Legislation

All proposals to introduce or amend legislation are subject to successful completion of the necessary processes. This includes Accessible Parking Bays, Speed Limits, Traffic Regulation Orders (such as one-way), Parking and waiting restrictions (such as yellow lines) etc. A notice of intention of proposals is published in local papers which offers the opportunity for the public to submit their views on the proposals. Objections, when received, must be fully considered and addressed before any scheme can be taken forward for implementation.

SECTION 3 - NETWORK MAINTENANCE

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EXPLANATION OF MAINTENANCE OPERATIONS

Resurfacing and Strengthening

Roads generally fail by cracking and rutting. They usually do not fail suddenly, but gradually deteriorate due to the impact of traffic, age and weathering. Wear normally appears as either excessive permanent deformation of the whole or part of the carriageway structure or is associated with the cracking of the bituminous layers.

Roads are normally designed for an operational life of 20 years. During this period and beyond, there is a need for the highway authority to intervene at times to either treat or replace the top layer of bituminous material known as the "surface course" or to provide additional depth to preserve the underlying structure of the road and extend its life.

Resurfacing is the application of a layer of this mixed material of 40mm minimum thickness. It strengthens the road, seals it against the ingress of water, and improves skidding resistance and riding quality.

Surface course Bitumen Macadam (Bitmac) has an expected life of 7-12 years which can be extended by subsequent surface dressing. Bitmac is a more flexible material than Asphalt and more suitable for the deformation and movement associated with weaker underlying ground conditions.

Asphalt resurfacing is more appropriate to heavily trafficked roads and junctions having a robust roadbase. It is more expensive and has a longer expected life of 15-20 years.

Resurfacing of existing roads can usually be carried out on top of the existing surface (overlay) but where drainage or kerb levels or bridge heights are restricted the existing surface may need to be removed before the resurfacing takes place.

Surface Dressing

This process involves spraying a bitumen emulsion binder onto the existing road surface, followed by a layer of stone chippings, which is then rolled. This seals the road preventing ingress of water thus extending the life expectancy of the road and also helps to improve the skid resistance on the surface.

Drainage Works

The quick and effective drainage of surface water from the carriageway contributes significantly to road safety and helps to prevent damage to the road itself. Improvement works carried out include the upgrading of the existing drainage facilities to ensure effective dispersal of surface water and prevent as far as possible the occurrence of standing water or flooding

of the road. In many cases the provision of new drainage facilities has to be undertaken including the installation of road gullies, pipes and manholes leading to a suitable discharge point.

Grass Cutting

Grass cutting is carried out for road safety reasons rather than for amenity purposes. The Department's grass cutting policy has evolved to focus on protecting wildlife and promoting biodiversity when managing roadside verges. A single swathe will be cut along the verges on the strategic road network twice per year. Other areas that are needed for road safety purpose, such as sightlines at junctions, will also be cut at least twice each year with additional cuts as and when needed. A similar approach will be introduced on heavier trafficked rural roads and on lighter trafficked rural roads, one cut will be carried out late in the growing season where it is safe to do so.

Gully Emptying

In 2024/25 as in the previous year, the Department currently aims to maintain the level of service and inspect and clean, where necessary, all gullies once annually.

Rural Roads Fund

In 2024/25, approximately £10m has been allocated to a Roads Recovery Fund from the structural maintenance budget specifically designed to address the roads which have been worst affected by recent under investment. £8m of this investment is being targeted towards rural roads. We will use this fund to carry out short lengths of resurfacing rather than repairing a large number of individual potholes in problem areas. Section Engineers, and their staff, across the Division are identifying the worst locations for inclusion on our works programmes. This work will reduce the number of potholes across the network and help prevent additional defects from forming.

Defects

Section Office staff regularly inspect the local network for actionable defects in accordance with the Road Maintenance Guidelines. These guidelines classify the local roads according to traffic volume and establish corresponding deadlines for the repair of any defects identified. Also, in an effort to maximise our effectiveness in delivering key road maintenance functions, we ask that members of the public and elected representatives who have access to the internet to please report road defects via the DfI online reporting facility provided by NI Direct; https://www.nidirect.gov.uk/information-and-services/travel-transport-and-roads/problems-roads-and-streets. Alternatively, faults that are considered to be an emergency can be reported by telephone as shown on Page 59.

MAINTENANCE OF STRUCTURES

Highway Structures include bridges, sign gantries and retaining walls. All bridges must be capable of carrying 40 tonne vehicles and this requirement has led to the ongoing assessment of bridges in the area.

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MAJOR PROJECTS SOUTH

4.1 Newry Southern Relief Road

The Newry Southern Relief Road is being developed to provide a strategic link between the A1/N1 Belfast to Dublin corridor and the A2 Warrenpoint Road, bypassing Newry City Centre. The 2.98km road link, which was estimated in the range £110 - £130m, comprises of a single carriageway, widened to incorporate a climbing lane (2+1 lane) with a maximum gradient of 6%. It is one of the three infrastructure projects being taken forward by the Department within the Belfast Region City Deal, which has allocated £93.4m to the project.

A preferred route for the Newry Southern Relief Road was announced in October 2018. The preferred route links the A2 Warrenpoint Road with the A1 Ellisholding Junction, starting at a new at-grade roundabout on the A2 Warrenpoint Road, along the frontage of Greenbank Industrial Estate, and crossing the Newry River and Newry Ship Canal, just to the south of Drumalane Quarry. The route then heads in a westerly direction via a climbing lane section up Fathom Mountain traversing under Flagstaff Road to another bridge crossing of the Belfast-Dublin Railway Line before terminating at the A1 Ellisholding Junction. This grade separated junction will be redesigned to include two new slip roads to accommodate traffic travelling to / from the south.

The Minister recently reviewed the previous decision made on the form of the bridge over the Newry Ship Canal, in the absence of an Executive, under the Northern Ireland (Executive Formation etc) Act 2022 and concluded that the decision for a 50m span fixed bridge remained unchanged.

There are several reasons why the prioritisation of projects, currently in the pipeline, was necessary, including the challenging budgetary position and constrained resources (in terms of finance and staff) and, importantly, the Department's commitments under the Climate Change (NI) Act 2022. The publication of the prioritised list of major road schemes, explains that development work on the Newry Southern Relief Road will continue to progress towards the next key decision regarding publication of draft Orders.

The current stage of the project involves developing the design of the road and preparing the draft Statutory Orders, along with an Environmental Impact Assessment Report (EIAR).

Following publication of the draft Statutory Orders and the EIAR a formal period of consultation will take place. This consultation will provide an opportunity for anyone who wishes to express an opinion on the EIAR or to object to the making of the Orders. This is currently scheduled for Autumn 2024.

Planning for the publication of the Statutory Orders and EIAR is ongoing which will afford all stakeholders and the public an opportunity to provide their views on the proposed scheme. Additional scheme information is available at:

4.2 A1 Junctions Phase 2 (A1J2)

This proposal, which is estimated to cost in the range of £100m - £110m (currently under review), involves the construction of four grade separated junctions (flyovers) to facilitate the closing up of all openings in the central median and installation of a continuous central median concrete safety barrier along a 25 km stretch of the A1 dual carriageway between Hillsborough Roundabout and Loughbrickland, improving road safety for all road users on the A1.

The grade separated junctions will be located at:

- Listullycurran Road
- Gowdystown Road
- Skeltons Road / Drumneath Road
- Waringsford Road

In addition, the proposal includes the provision of a northbound on-slip at Castlewellan Road at Banbridge, a link between the existing underpass junction at Hillsborough Road, Dromore and Milebush Road and the closing of nine minor road junctions along this section of the A1.

All other roads will then operate on a left in - left out basis. A number of Private Accesses onto the A1 are also proposed for closure.

The Environmental Impact Assessment Report (EIAR) and draft Statutory Orders were published in March 2019 and the Public Inquiry into the scheme was held in March 2020. The Public Inquiry Inspector issued his report to the Department on 19 October 2020. Following the publication of the Departmental Statement on 28 January 2021, the Statutory Orders for the scheme were then made, with the Stopping Up (of Private Accesses) Order coming into operation on 24th June 2021 and the Direction Order on 16th July 2021.

On-site works for the advance ground investigations and archaeological investigations are now complete.

The Infrastructure Minister John O'Dowd, on 2 July 2024, announced in the NI Assembly that the scheme will now proceed to the procurement stage. Work is ongoing to finalise the Business Case and complete the preparation of the contract documents. Further progression of the A1J2 scheme to formal procurement and subsequent construction will depend on the approval of the Business Case, clearing the remaining statutory procedures and funding being made available to the Department.

The contractor procurement exercise will then take between 12 - 15 months. Construction is expected to take a further three years to build the scheme.

4.3 A24 Ballynahinch Bypass

The proposed A24 Ballynahinch Bypass aligns to the east of the town, from a new roundabout at the junction of the A24 Belfast Road and the A21 Saintfield Road to a new roundabout located at the existing junction of the B2 Downpatrick Road and the A24 Drumaness Road. A compact grade separated junction connects the B7 Crossgar Road with the proposed bypass. The 3.1km bypass, which was estimated in the range £50m - £60m, comprises of a single 2-lane carriageway bypass with widening to provide overtaking opportunities. A 'Park & Share' facility to accommodate 27 parking bays is proposed on the northern side of the scheme. The main objectives are to improve journey times, journey time reliability and safety. The bypass would provide a route for strategic traffic that would reduce traffic congestion on Ballynahinch and enhance the town centre environment.

The Direction Order for the A24 Ballynahinch Bypass was made on 16 July 2021. The statutory processes are now largely complete however, the Vesting Order for the scheme cannot be made until funding has been secured to deliver the project. Development work has been substantially concluded, including preparation of a draft business case.

In August 2023 the Department published a prioritised list of major road schemes that will continue to be progressed and all other schemes paused and their place on a future major works programme will be informed by emerging transport plans and a decision by a future Infrastructure Minister; this is available at:

Regretfully, the A24 Ballynahinch Bypass has currently been paused.

There are several reasons why the prioritisation of projects currently in the pipeline was necessary, including the challenging budgetary position and constrained resources (in terms of finance and staff) and, importantly, the Department's commitments under the Climate Change (NI) Act 2022.

Transport policies and plans are currently being reviewed and updated to align with these commitments and this work will help define what major transport infrastructure projects should be included within any future major roads programme. Due to financial and resourcing pressures the Department can only deliver those road projects where there are identified alternative funding streams such as Flagship and City and Growth Deal projects.

SECTION 5 - STRANGFORD LOUGH FERRY SERVICE

Responsibility for the Strangford Ferry no longer falls under the remit of Dfl Roads Southern Division, responsibility has transferred to the Department's Public Transport Operations Division.

General Level of Service

In general, the ferry service has operated smoothly throughout the period April 2023 to March 2024. Of a total of 21,472 scheduled sailings, 108 were cancelled due to fog, 32 sailings were cancelled due to staff unavailability, 550 sailings were cancelled due to Industrial Action and 158 sailings were lost as a result of mechanical and technical issues. This represented an overall reliability of 96.69% for the year.

Strangford and Portaferry Harbours

The marshalling system in Strangford continued to operate at weekends and on busy holidays from April to mid-September. This alleviated most of the congestion from the remainder of the village.



SECTION 6 - ENGAGING WITH DFI ROADS

Dealing with Correspondence / Public Interface

Due to continued resourcing challenges the Department's current approach in dealing with queries is set out below to maintain a level of service.

One area of significant workload is dealing with correspondence. The Department, and in particular Dfl Roads, receives a large volume of correspondence from the public and public representatives throughout the year. To give a sense of scale, Southern Division has in recent years received more than 40,000 items of correspondence in one year. Indeed, the level of correspondence has been increasing in recent years at a time when resources have been reducing which is adversely impacting on our ability to deliver key services and public safety responsibilities. Therefore, in an effort to maximise our effectiveness in delivering key road maintenance functions, we ask that members of the public and elected representatives who have access to the internet please report road defects via the Dfl online reporting facility provided by NI Direct; https://www.nidirect.gov.uk/information-and-services/travel-transport-and-roads/problems-roads-and-streets.

Alternatively, faults that are considered to be an emergency (<u>during working hours</u>) can be reported by telephone to 028 90 540540.

Section Offices will be opened to the public from 10am - 12noon with meetings outside of this able to be arranged by appointment also.

Emergency Out of Office Hours Assistance

We have a call centre to deal with calls <u>outside normal office</u> hours. Dfl Roads personnel can be called upon to deal with emergencies such as flooding, obstructions such as fallen trees, and when requested by Emergency Services, in clearing up after road traffic collisions. Routine roads related matters are <u>not</u> dealt with by this service and should be raised with Dfl Roads offices during normal working hours.
