NISRA: Trusted statistics & research for a better society

The Northern Ireland Statistics and Research Agency (NISRA), which incorporates the General Register Office (GRO), is an executive agency within the Department of Finance and was established on 1 April 1996 under the Government's Next Steps Initiative.

NISRA is the principal source of Official Statistics and social research on Northern Ireland. These statistics and research not only inform public policy but also academic and private sector research, and contribute to debate in the wider community. NISRA's services are afforded to a wide range of Government Departments and Non-Departmental Public Bodies, as well as Local Councils to assist the policy process and delivery of their objectives and actions. NISRA is also responsible for conducting the decennial Census of Population.

NI: IN PROFILE is a resource pack of key statistics covering a range of areas of life in Northern Ireland. The pack brings together a range of data into a single place and will be of interest to a broad audience, including policy makers in the public and private sector, students and academics, schools and the general public.

Statistics have primarily been sourced from across the Northern Ireland Statistics & Research Agency, however where official statistics are not available statistics from other sources have been included. The pack is intended to provide a high-level statistical summary of life in Northern Ireland and you will note that it does not include detailed commentary. If you wish to delve further into the detail of a particular statistic, you are encouraged to follow the links provided.

Thanks are due to those NISRA statisticians across all government departments who advised on the most appropriate statistics to include under their own area of expertise. 
Population growing – currently stands at 1.87 million.

- Growth is mainly due to natural change (births-deaths). Net migration is a small factor.
- Population is ageing; the 1960s baby-boom will drive faster ageing in the next decade.
- In the next decade we are projected to have more older people (65+) than children.
- Fertility rate has levelled off over the last 20 years following a prolonged decline, particularly among women aged under 30.
- Deaths from circulatory disease (e.g. heart attack and stroke) have more than halved since the early 1980s.



Total Population




Components of Population Change


Fertility Rate of Women aged 15-44*




One in five people have a disability or limiting long-term illness.



Population Characteristics (from 2011 Census)




Population by Local Government District, 2017

DID YOU KNOW? NISRA incorporates the General Register Office (GRO) for NI. The GRO is responsible for the administration of the marriage and civil partnership law along with the registration of births, deaths, adoptions and gender recognition. GRO is also responsible for the maintenance of registration records and the production of certificates for these events.


Number of households continues to increase (703,300 in 2011).

- Households are predominantly occupied by one or two people.
- Two in three households are owner occupied (outright or with a mortgage).
- Private renting accounts for one in seven of all households.
- 80,000 older people live on their own.
- Around one in five people live in a household with an income below the relative poverty threshold (before housing costs).





Household Composition from Census, 2011





Distribution of Household Size (1961 and 2011)






Average* Weekly Household Income


House prices continue upward trend, having bottomed out in 2013.

- Number of households on the social housing waiting list in 'housing stress' continues to rise.






Total Housing Stock

Number of Households in Housing Stress, at 31 March






Economic inactivity has remained high over the long-term.


- Almost three in ten people aged 16-64 are economically inactive.
- Employment rate has returned to pre-recession levels.
- Average full-time employee earns £520 per week.
- The proportion of jobs paying at or near minimum wage has doubled since 1999.
- More than a quarter of jobs pay less than the Real Living Wage*.
- Increase in jobs since economic downturn driven by service sector. 11,000 fewer construction jobs compared with 2007.

DID YOU KNOW? Economically inactive people are not in employment but do not meet the definition of unemployment because they have not been seeking work within the last four weeks and/or they are unable to start work within the next two weeks. This group includes all those who are looking after a home, long-term sick or disabled, students and retired.




Economic output growing, but still below pre-recession levels.

- Sales by local companies worth £67 billion, £21 billion to customers outside NI.
- Fall in external sales over the last year driven by a substantial decline in the 'Food, Beverages and Tobacco' sub sector.
- Largest contributor to Gross Value Added (GVA) is 'Wholesale and retail trade; repair of motor vehicles' .
- Vast majority of local businesses have fewer than 10 employees.
- Half of all employees work in a business with 250 or more staff.




Gross Value Added (Balanced Approach) by Industry, 2017, £ million





Total Gross Value Added (GVA) (Balanced Approach) £ billion




Sales of Goods and Services by Destination, £ billion


VAT/PAYE Businesses by Employment Size, 2018 (Base: 74,000)





Working Age Claimants*




Pension Age Claimants






Working Age Claimants* by Age and Gender, Aug 2018



Pension Age Claimants by Age and Gender, Aug 2018




Claimants by Type of Disability Benefit




- Proportion of working age adults with no formal qualifications remains high, but has fallen over the past two decades.
- Educational attainment of school leavers increasing; 70% of children leave school with five or more GCSEs (A*-C) including English and Maths. Two in five leave school with three or more A levels (A*-C).
- Number of primary school pupils up 12% on ten years ago.
- Proportion of pupils at grammar schools increased over the last 25 years.




Qualifications of School Leavers





Destination of School Leavers, 2016/17










- Proportion of households with two or more cars/vans has quadrupled over the last 45 years.




Household – Car/Van Availability






Life expectancy rising over the long-term and gender gap closing.


- Demand for the health service continues to increase.
- 41.5 million prescription items issued (22 items on average per person in 2017).
- Around 820,000 attendances at emergency care departments, 300,000 inpatient admissions and 310,000 day cases in 2017/18.
- Around 300 suicides each year (three in four suicides are of men).
- Around a fifth of adults have a possible mental health problem.









Crime levels have been falling.


- Robbery, burglary, theft and criminal damage offences have fallen over the long-term. Violent, sexual and drug offences have increased.
- Although widely accepted that there is under-reporting, domestic abuse crimes recorded by police are increasing and account for 15% of all recorded crime.
- Sectarian crimes have fallen considerably over the last decade.
- Prison population has fallen by more than a fifth in the last three years, following a prolonged period of increase.



Households / Adults Victims of Crime Once or More





Police Recorded Crime (excl Fraud) Rate per 1,000 Population





Police Recorded Hate Crime





Cases Resulting in Conviction at Court or Out of Court Disposal





Average Daily Prison Population





Number of farms has fallen substantially over the last few decades.

- Most farms are very small and unlikely to provide full-time employment or an adequate income solely from farming.
- Four in every five farms are cattle and sheep farms.
- A small proportion of farms depend mainly on cropping (4%).
- Dairy accounts for one in ten farms but contributes 32% of agricultural output.
- Agriculture accounts for 1.7% of total Gross Value Added (GVA).



% Farms





Greenhouse gas emissions have fallen over the long-term.


- Two-thirds of emissions are from agriculture, transport and energy sectors.

- Household recycling has risen steadily over the last decade - almost half of household waste is recycled.




Greenhouse Gas Emissions (MtCO₂e)



Greenhouse Gas Emissions by Sector, 2016




Mean Annual Min. & Max. Temperatures





% Electricity Consumption from Renewable Sources





We are a more 'online' society.


- Four in five households have broadband access. Uptake of broadband technology has been rapid (three-fold increase in twelve years).
- 'Superfast' broadband ($\geq 30\text{Mbit/s}$) is available to nine in ten premises and 'Ultrafast' ($\geq 300\text{Mbit/s}$) to four in ten.
- 13% of adults have never used the internet - internet use declines markedly with age.
- Less than half (44%) of those aged 70 and over used the internet in the last three months, although this rate has increased substantially over the last few years.



Households (Internet & Broadband Access)





Internet Users, 16+







Tablet Computer Ownership, Households





Top 10 Internet Activities, 2018





Public sector spend has fallen in real terms since 2009/10.

- Spend per head is higher here than in rest of the UK (20% more than the UK average).
- Social Protection (welfare and state pension) accounts for more than 40% (£9 bn) of all spend. Health accounts for a further 20% (£4.2 bn).

Total Identifiable Expenditure on Services by Main Function, 2016/17, £ million



Value of external sales has fallen over the last year, but not in all markets.


- GB accounts for 53% of external sales.

- Latest survey figures indicate there was a reduction in the number of people living here in 2017 who were born in the rest of the EU (non-UK and Ireland).
- NI-IE border sees 72 million vehicle crossings per annum, including 6.4 million HGV crossings.







Voter Turnout






