



Interdepartmental Homelessness Action Plan 2017–18

Year 1 Report

This document contains the results for the first year (2017–18) of the Interdepartmental Homelessness Action Plan.

The Interdepartmental Homelessness Action Plan was developed to complement the NI Housing Executive's Homelessness Strategy and focuses on addressing gaps in those non-accommodation services that have the most impact, or have the potential to more positively impact, on the lives and life chances of people who are homeless and those who are at most risk of homelessness.

Following an initial Homelessness Workshop involving Government Departments, statutory partners, homelessness service providers and service users, agreement was reached on five main priority areas:

- 1. Health and wellbeing, including mental health and substance misuse;
- 2. Education and awareness raising children, young people, schools and providers;
- 3. Support for those leaving places of care, children's residential and foster care, prisons, hospitals, mental health facilities;

- Support for families including support for those experiencing domestic violence, and community support mechanisms;
- 5. Employability, financial capability and access to benefits.

A total of nine actions from these priority areas were identified and taken forward in the first year.

The Homelessness Strategy Steering Group (HSSG), which is chaired by the Department for Communities (DfC) and includes representation from the Departments of Health (DoH), Department of Justice (DoJ), Department of Education (DE), statutory agencies and the voluntary sector, had overall responsibility for monitoring and reporting on the Action Plan. HSSG reviewed quarterly progress reports on the Action Plan and signed-off on the Year 1 results. HSSG will also be responsible for signing-off any future iterations of the Action Plan.

PRIORITY AREA 1 Health and wellbeing, including mental health and substance misuse

A Task & Finish Group was established by the Chief Medical Officer in DoH, the purpose of which was to determine possible service models which will increase access to primary health care and other health and social care services for people who are homeless. The group reviewed existing information on the health needs of people who have experience of Homelessness and known difficulties in accessing health and social care services. A draft report, which includes detail on the barriers faced by people who are homeless, has been completed. Barriers identified include: GP Registration Accessing GP service when registered Geographical location of services Difficult and chaotic life circumstances Mental Health needs Discharge from hospital and lack of intermediate care/step down facilities



2. Promote the use of the Hospital Discharge Protocol across Health and Social Care organisations

By June 2017, establish agreed accountability mechanisms with the Health and Social Care Trusts for the implementation of the Hospital Discharge Protocol.

By Autumn 2017, establish and implement arrangements for auditing how well the Hospital Discharge Protocol has been used in respect of people who are homeless being discharged from hospital.

This output has not been achieved by the target date, and the implementation of an audit process will take longer than expected to establish. However, DoH is committed to working with partners to ensure action on this important area is taken forward.

Education and awareness raising – children, young people, schools and providers

Building on outcome 1, CCEA will establish a database of useful resources/materials to be made available through the CCEA website for teachers to draw upon when teaching active citizenship.	Members of the Homelessness Steering Group identified existing materials from their organisations/other agencies that can be used in schools. The Steering Group identified mechanisms for providing training, engagement and launch events to promote the Homelessness resource in schools in autumn 2018. Throughout the Interdepartmental Homelessness Action Plan cycle, a database of useful resources/materials will be established to support teaching active citizenship. This resource is now available on the CCEA website for schools from autumn 2018 and develop further across the lifespan of the project.

Support for those leaving places of care, including institutional care, children's residential and foster care, prisons, hospitals, mental health facilities.

		By 31 March 2018, support the HSCB in its work to encourage providers of supported accommodation, lodging and floating support services for vulnerable young people aged 16–21+ to make maximum use of the IBU Community Outreach services.	A Regional Group on Welfare Benefits Meeting was held with representatives from the Health and Social Care Board and Trusts to discuss the impact of Universal Credit on Care Leavers. It was agreed that a regional information session should be arranged with the 16+ team practitioners and managers, providers of supported accommodation for vulnerable young people and foster carers. Presentation took place on 27 February 2018.

DfC is working with MACS Supporting Children and Young People (MACS) and the Council for the Homeless NI (CHNI) to help identify any gaps in current provision of services. Young MACS service users have produced a creative piece of work which captures their experiences of homelessness and the current service provision available and any perceived gaps. CHNI is currently undertaking a NI wide scoping and analysis exercise to map and better identify the range of services, outside of mainstream homelessness provision, that can contribute to the prevention and/or alleviation of youth homelessness and to highlight the needs of young people and their experience of accessing services and support. Once the 2 projects are completed and analysed a pilot mapping exercise will be developed.

The report will be underpinned by: Mapping existing benefit/employability interventions that contribute to addressing/ preventing homelessness and identifying potential gaps in services; Reviewing how other jurisdictions support vulnerable customers to access benefits and employability services and considering the applicability of these support mechanisms in NI; Conducting customer profiling/segmentation to better understand the needs of vulnerable groups in accessing services. 	A review of the benefit mapping work highlighted some additional work to review European Social Fund, NIHE and Local Authority programmes. The research component is being augmented with a review of approaches in other European jurisdictions. Any recommendations arising will have to be considered before release of the report.
