European Heritage Open Days 2022 Report



European Heritage Open Days are held in Northern Ireland as part of the annual European wide festival. Historic Environment Division within the Department for Communities co-ordinates this event. The purpose is to promote public interest in built heritage and to raise awareness of its cultural significance and benefit to the community.





Northern Ireland has a rich and diverse historic environment which is all around us, in our cities, towns, villages and countryside, shaping the places in which we live, work, visit and enjoy. It embodies our past, it enriches our present and is our legacy for future generations. This historic

environment supports our prosperity, strengthens our society and shapes our character. Which means that by treasuring our past, we can enrich our future.

European Heritage Open Days (EHOD) is a key event in our calendar that provides a taste of the value of our historic environment. By understanding the value and benefits that our historic environment and heritage can bring to everyone, it helps to ensure that it is protected and treasured now and for our children's children.

The theme for EHOD this year was "Sustainable Heritage: Learn, Use, Enjoy" which encourages us to look at how to protect and preserve our rich and diverse cultural heritage for new generations, as well as its role now in building a more sustainable and resilient future for communities and the natural environment.

This year, the 25th EHOD in Northern Ireland, took place on 10 and 11 September with over 200 heritage buildings and events opening free of charge during the weekend. This coincided with a period of national mourning however, events proceeded with some cancellations and adjustments whilst still upholding the deepest respect for Her late Majesty Queen Elizabeth II.

The Open Days are a success due to the efforts of a wide range of communities which help deliver a largely volunteer led programme. This involves strong partnerships with a range of organisations such as Tourism NI, Museums NI, Irish Landmark Trust, National Trust NI and other government and voluntary bodies and individuals. Such partnerships are key if we are to make the most of our historic environment.

I would therefore like to take this opportunity to thank the many individual owners, groups and volunteers who allowed access to these wonderful places which capture our heritage. Without that enthusiasm and generosity these weekend events would not be possible.

Support for the event

The EHOD team provided some marketing materials, both printed and digital, to support event organisers. We provided guidance on delivering events, information on the theme, how to promote events through social media and how to complete risk assessments and general promotion of events. It also included advice on promoting the Open days on national media platforms.

The team developed an App to support visitors to easily see what was on in an area. The Web App proved to be a a great resource as it was easily accessed on a mobile, and presented all events on a map enabling visitors to see what was on in an area very quickly and easily.

Programme highlights

With 257 events registered for European Heritage Open Days 2022 it is difficult to showcase all of these fantastic events, so we have selected a very small snapshot from across the region showing the variety of the type of events that are organised for EHOD annually by our wonderful volunteers.









Sheils buildings Carrickfergus

The Charles Sheils Community offered guided tours of the grounds of the Charles Sheils Houses in Carrickfergus which allowed visitors to view the B2 listed buildings dating back to 1868. In keeping with the Sustainable Heritage theme 'using what is there' for European Heritage Open Days 2022, the grounds show conservation, bio diversity and recycling at work in the setting of a Victorian demesne. As well as the kitchen garden, there is an allotment style area, wildlife pond, fruit bush enclosure, compost area and a rare strawberry tree on site. A perimeter forest style path allows visitors a good view of the buildings along with access driveway and paths leading up to the houses.

Origami House

Award winning Architect, Jane Burnside, and author of Contemporary Design Secrets: The Art of Building a House in the Countryside welcomed visitors to her home and studio, The Origami House. As seen on BBC House of the Year, the Origami House is an extraordinary contemporary white and glass house, set in beautiful, landscaped gardens on the edge of the Glens of Antrim.

Greencastle Walks

Historic Environment Division, staff member Anthony Kirby provided his interesting, guided tour of this amazing castle and surrounding area. Greencastle is a Royal castle built in the mid-13th century by Hugh de Lacy to control the southern approach into Ulster. Greencastle was a key fortification for over 400 years and was repeatedly besieged, relieved and repaired before falling into ruins after bombardment by Cromwell's troops in 1652. The castle is prominently situated on rocky outcrop close to Greencastle Point.

Headhunters Barber Shop & Railway Museum

The Johnston family's decision to combine their traditional barbers skills with their interest in local railway history has led to one of the most unique and fascinating attractions. Headhunters Barber Shop & Railway Museum has one of the largest collections of small Irish railway artefacts on display, many kindly donated by former railway employees which were on display over European Heritage Open Days weekend.
