EC BIRDS DIRECTIVE: EAST COAST (NORTHEN IRELAND) MARINE SPECIAL PROTECTION AREA

You are invited to respond to a consultation on proposals to classify an area off the East Coast of Northern Ireland as a Marine Special Protection Area (SPA).

The area that has been proposed as the East Coast (NI) Marine SPA begins at Ringfad near Carnlough and extends to Cloghan Head near Ardglass. A map is provided.

This consultation document is aimed at organisations, groups and people who undertake activities, or have a general interest, in this marine area.

Background

Member States are required to conserve the habitat of certain rare, vulnerable or regularly occurring migratory species of birds, through the designation of SPAs, in accordance with the Council Directive on the Conservation of Wild Birds (79/409/EEC). There are currently 16 sites designated as SPAs in Northern Ireland.

The information to support the designation of this proposed SPA has come from studies undertaken by the Joint Nature Conservation Committee.

- A site map showing the waters within the boundary of the Marine SPA,

The proposals detailed in this consultation package are aimed at affording greater protection to our nationally important habitats and species through the designation of Marine Special Protection Areas. It is important that these unique areas of the marine habitat are managed sustainably and promoted as a valuable social and economic asset.
