CORE FUNDING AWARDS 2016

THOUSANDS OF PEOPLE SET TO BENEFIT FROM NEW ROUND OF COMMUNITY RELATIONS FUNDING

Thirty-three groups tackling sectarianism and promoting understanding across Northern Ireland are sharing over £1.2million in funding distributed by the Community Relations Council on behalf of the Office of the First and Deputy First Minister it was announced at a special event in CRC's offices at Equality House, Belfast. The funding is aligned with, and contributes to, the delivery of the NI Executive's Together: Building a United Community strategy.

The funding will support a wide variety of community relations and peace building work, including community relations work with schools involving parents, children and teachers; theatre projects promoting cross-cultural understanding; history projects working across the interfaces in Belfast, cross community sports initiatives; and projects to increase the use of shared space for the arts. All are designed to promote diverse participation, trust and mutual understanding between political, cultural and religious communities across the region whether they live in rural or inner-city communities.

Welcoming the funding, CRC Chief Executive, Jacqueline Irwin said, "This funding is going to support important work across the region to build a more shared and united community using sport, drama, education, training and the arts. It will support activity to build strong bonds of connection and sharing between people of all ages, social and cultural backgrounds in rural areas as well as in our cities. In this way we believe it will also help to build a safer environment for us all. We are pleased to distribute this vital funding on behalf of the Executive Office and we encourage more people to get in touch with us and be involved in building a united community now and for the future."

First Minister, Arlene Foster said: "Northern Ireland is a great place to live and we have come a long way in the last few years. These gains need to be secured and built upon. Our community and voluntary organisations are at the grass roots of our society and are ideally placed to help build good relations. This £1.2million funding will go a long way to help make the aims of the Together: Building a United Community strategy a reality, helping us build a stronger, better Northern Ireland"

The deputy First Minister, Martin McGuinness said: "Equality of opportunity, good relations and reconciliation will remain at the forefront of the Executive's work to improve the lives of everyone in the community. We are determined to tackle sectarianism, racism and other forms of intolerance. The Executive cannot achieve our vision for a shared future alone and it is only by working together we can deliver the better tomorrow we all aspire to. Everyone has a role to play and I have no doubt all the groups receiving this funding will make a real difference and help us to create a society free from division, hate and separation."

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The funding has been allocated to groups in locations across Northern Ireland including Belfast, Derry/Londonderry, Ballymoney, Enniskillen, Armagh, Cookstown, Lurgan, Armagh and Ballycastle.

Organisations/projects receiving funding include:

- Prime Cut Productions The Girdwood Project which works with Lower Old Park, Lower Shankill, Cliftonville and New Lodge Communities over a 9 month period, using theatre to promote mutual respect and understanding.
- Ballynafeigh Community Development Association (Belfast): projects include facilitating 7 key faith organisations within the neighbourhood of Ballynafeigh through a series of events and organise Open your Space events to encourage the Orange Order and Apprentice Boys to open their venues to encourage understanding of cultural traditions.
- Corrymeela Community (Ballycastle): Projects include *Inspiring Women Together* and *Facing Our History, Shaping Our Future* project.
- East Belfast Mission: Projects include provision of shared space to deliver nine weekly Irish language classes for local residents.
- The Junction/ Holywell (Derry/ Londonderry): Projects include Pop-up democracy workshops across city venues, a comprehensive training programme dealing with the legacy of the past and working to establish a Troubles Museums within the city.

The Community Relations Council relocated from Murray Street to Equality House in April 2016. The Community Relations Council, which recently marked its 25th year in operation, works with a wide range of community organisations to develop greater understanding and co-operation between political, cultural and religious communities in Northern Ireland. RECONCILIATION, EDUCATION AND COMMUNITY TRAINING (REACT)

Late last year a group of 11 people from Catholic and Protestant communities in the Armagh area undertook and Irish history course which examined some of the most turbulent periods in our history (1916, Catholic emancipation, the period from the Third Home Rule Bill to partition and the establishment of Northern Ireland and the Civil War in the South. The final module is on the Troubles) which still impact on us today.

Various versions of Irish history have been developed that have often distorted or deleted events and are representative of one side or another but often exclusive to a political allegiance. These versions often carry with them a toxic sense of victimhood that can lead to polarisation and often contempt of the 'other'. In our recent past these narratives have kept many people in social networks that exist side by side but rarely integrated.

The Rebels, Radicals, Royalists & Loyalists(RRR&L) course was designed to imbue a shared understanding of the past, an understanding that demonstrates respect, or at least acknowledgement of, events through sharing wider experiential realities.

The course takes an informal and relaxed approach and uses attempts to reach a fuller understanding by way of a sensory experience.

Throughout the module there is auditory and visual presentation of material both by the trainer and through historical film records that have been resourced from within the public domain. During each module participants are encouraged to express their thinking on what they are observing and this interactive element creates a platform for sharing thoughts and feelings.



In combination with the workshop format participants take part in field study days. These study days centre on Belfast and Dublin and take in places that have significant bearing on deepening understanding of a shared history and acknowledging perceived injustices that have been intergenerational. This element of the course involves journeying together to public memorials that represent community narratives.

As has been the case with the previous five groups who completed the course, the autumn 2015 group has a desire to further their knowledge by continuing to explore events that have shaped minds and thus our society.

REACT is a Core Funded community organisation based in Armagh City, covering the Mid Ulster area, with the aim of supporting marginalized groups and individuals through

STRIVE-A UNITED YOUTH PILOT

Young people, their family and friends, elected representatives, programme funders, and staff from five partner organisations packed into Girdwood Community Hub last month to celebrate the achievements of 51 young people who completed Strive, a United Youth Pilot.

Strive, a 'youth-led' programme, was developed and delivered by Include Youth in partnership with Newstart Education Centre, East Belfast Alternatives, Lisburn YMCA and Youth Initiatives Poleglass.

Young people, aged 16 to 24, who were in need of education, training or employment, participated in the eight month pilot programme which was designed by young people for young people and underpinned by a youth work approach. The pilot programme focused on the four main United Youth themes: good relations, citizenship, personal development and employability.

Strive worked from the principle that young people are experts in their own lives – whether personal challenges or successes, their experience of growing up in a particular community or their experiences of education – therefore were best equipped to shape the programme.

Young people who had been on a previous programmes with the partner organisations formed an 'Expert by Experience' (EBE) group to help design and run the programme. They created development plans around the main United Youth themes to equip the youth workers to run the programme in each of the four areas. As the programme progressed they recruited more young people to the EBE group to reflect the views of current participants.

It's been a busy five years for Sutemos Youth Dance since their very first performance in 2011 to now two thriving youth dance groups with young people from nine different cultural backgrounds. A DU Dance (NI) youth engagement group Sutemos has grown in strength and confidence performing at international youth dance events in Germany, Dublin and Belfast to guest performances on the BBC National Lottery Show in 2015 and at the recent Northern Ireland Assembly's St Patrick's Concert at Stormont March 2016.

Their light shows no signs of slowing down either as the group celebrated their five year anniversary with a special performance *Twilight* at the brand new **events space on the Hill of the O'Neill, Dungannon, Saturday 9th April**. Bringing together new dance work by Sutemos, choreography from the young dancers themselves and a special debut performance of the newly established Suteminis, a group for 8-11 year olds, the evening presented something new, rich and hugely unique for the people of Dungannon, attended by special guest Deputy Chair, Councillor Kim Ashton, Mid Ulster District Council.

Sheena Kelly, local Choreographer and community dance artist, has supported and facilitated by the group since its inception and said:

"It has been such a pleasure to work in my hometown with Sutemos these last five years and having the opportunity to look back and see all that we have accomplished has made me very proud. I want to thank all the dancers for their talent and hard work and can't wait to see what the next five years will bring".

Belfast, June 2016 – PeacePlayers International-Northern Ireland is pleased to announce that its annual Jingle Ball basketball tournament will take place on 6th December at Queens PEC on the Campus of Queens University in Belfast at 1:00 PM. Over 150 Children aged 9-15 are expected to take part in this tournament, which is one of PeacePlayers' signature cross community events.

"We're pleased to host this signature event. Jingle Ball is Belfast's largest cross-community basketball tournament, and each year the children get more and more excited about it," said Gareth Harper, Managing Director of PeacePlayers. "During this tournament, and indeed during the Belfast Interface League that proceeded it, children don't have to worry about what part of the community they or their teammate belong to. It's all about enjoying the game of basketball and finding a productive way to deal with the conflict taking place around them."

The teams that participate in the Jingle Ball basketball tournament come from the Belfast Interface League (BIL). This after school programme is held at hubs located in north, south, west and east Belfast over the course of 12 weeks. Participants learn the skills needed to complete in basketball and participate in community relations activities where they discuss issues related to life in a post-conflict society.

"Most people in Northern Ireland are likely unaware of how popular basketball has become. The basic rules can be learnt in a manner of minutes and the sport can be played by people of nearly any age. Importantly the skills needed to excel at basketball – namely teamwork, determination, commitment and accountability – are also necessary to succeed in life," added Harper. "While the children who participate in BIL and Jingle Ball have a great time, they also leave better equipped to address the challenges they face on daily basis."

PeacePlayers chairman Trevor Ringland said, "This tournament is just one example of how sport can bridge divides. Each year PeacePlayers BIL has grown, from just 40 participants in one area in 2012, to over 150 participants from all sides of the city in 2016.

The Clinton International Summer School - 2016

They believe at INCORE that to build peace we need to make a real difference in society and individual lives. In 2016, the Summer School programme - now the Clinton International Summer School - will therefore focus directly on how peacebuilding can be enhanced by economic development.

The Clinton International Summer School at INCORE running from 17-24 June 2016 will provide a structured learning opportunity to analyze the dynamic and constantly changing field of conflict transformation and peacebuilding. Focusing on the latest research and concepts in peace and conflict studies and practice, participants are invited to compare, contrast and learn from different perspectives. Specifically, the School will seek in 2016 to to advance peacebuilding through positive change and economic development.

The programme will focus on building a new generation of global peacebuilders who can not only use the lessons from Northern Ireland peace process in their own contexts, but couple this with leadership, entrepreneurship and economic development. The Summer School will draw on a unique partnership of INCORE's conflict transformation skills and facilitators from Ulster Business School.

This module will provide the participants with a unique opportunity to experience first-hand Northern Ireland's historical conflict and that region's continuing road to reconciliation, peace and prosperity. The students will be required to identify in advance a project that would improve the economic and social conditions in their home region. Our team will then work with you to develop your idea over the course of the week enhancing it and helping put social change into practice. For details see the website.

Alongside the course there will be opportunity for participants to network with others, gaining a deeper insight into the causes and consequences of the conflict in Northern Ireland. The full package includes a weekend course learning about Northern Ireland including field visits, tours of the Derry City Walls and the Giant's Causeway, as well as a Game of Thrones tour.
