# CONFORMATION U

\*HE conformation scores achieved by the price reported prime cattle kill in Northern Ireland during the second quarter of 2016 were broadly similar to the corresponding period in 2015. There were however some slight differences for some classes of cattle year on year.

#### Steers

During the 2016 period under analysis 19.8 per cent of the price reported NI steer kill achieved a U grade, almost unchanged from the 19.7 per cent achieving a U grade in the corresponding period in 2015. The proportion of steers awarded an R grade increased slightly from 39 per cent in the 2015 period to 39.3 per cent in the 2016 period as outlined in Table 1.

Meanwhile the proportion of O grade steer carcases in the NI price reported kill also recorded a marginal increase year on year. O grade carcases accounted for 31.3 per cent of the NI steer kill in the 2016 period, up from 31.1 per cent in the corresponding period in 2015. P grade steer carcases recorded a decrease year on year to account for 9.3 per cent of the price reported NI steer kill in the 2016 period. This was a 0.6 percentage point decrease from the previous year

when the proportion of P grade carcases was 9.9 per cent.

An increase in the number of young bulls being presented for slaughter in NI has resulted in a slight increase in the proportion of young bulls in the NI slaughter mix during the second quarter of 2016 compared to the same period in 2015. As a result the proportion of steers has decreased from 51.5 per cent of the total prime cattle kill in the 2015 period to 50 per cent in the 2016 period. While there has been an overall decline in the proportion of steers in the NI prime cattle slaughter mix year on year there has also been a change to the proportion of steers sourced from the NI dairy and suckler herds year on

In the 2016 period 38.4 per cent of the price reported NI steer kill were sourced from the dairy herd, a 2.1 percentage point increase from the corresponding period in 2015 when 36.3 per cent of the steer kill were of dairy origin. Meanwhile the proportion of suckler origin steers accounted for 61.6 per cent of the price reported NI steer kill in the 2016 period compared to 63.7 per cent of the steer kill in the 2015 period.

Despite the increase in the proportion of steers sourced from the dairy herd in the NI kill the average steer carcase weight recorded an increase from 351kg in the 2015 period to 354kg in the 2016 period. The increased dairy influence on the NI steer kill has been counteracted by an increase in the dairy origin steer carcase weight from 324kg in the 2015 period to 328kg in the 2016 period. Meanwhile the average carcase weight of suckler origin steers also recorded an increase of 4kg year on year, up from 367kg in the 2015 to 371kg in the 2016 period.

### Heifers

During the second quarter of 2016  $\mbox{U}$ grading heifers accounted for 18.6 per cent of the NI heifer kill, a 0.5 percentage point decrease on the same period in 2015 as indicated in Table 2. The proportion of heifers awarded an R grade in quarter 2 2016 was back by 1.4 percentage points from 50.9 per cent in the 2015 period to 49.5 per cent in the 2016 period.

Meanwhile O grade heifers accounted for 26.2 per cent of the price reported heifer kill in the 2016 period, a 0.7 percentage point increase from the corresponding period in 2015. P grade heifer carcases recorded an increase of 1.2 percentage points from 4.4 per cent in the 2015 period to account for 5.6 per cent of the NI heifer kill in the 2016 period.

In the second quarter of 2016 35.9 per cent of the total prime cattle kill were heifers, down 1.5 percentage points from the corresponding period in 2015. The proportion of the NI heifer kill sourced from the dairy herd increased by 4.8 percentage points from 26.1 per cent in the 2015 period to 30.9 per cent in the 2016 period and this may be one reason behind the increase in the proportion of O and P grade heifer carcases in the NI slaughter mix.

The average price reported heifer carcase weight during April-June 2016 was 320kg, a 1kg increase from the corresponding period in 2015. The average carcase weight of heifers sourced from the dairy herd was 300kg in the 2016 period, an increase of 1kg from the same period in 2015. Meanwhile the average carcase weight of suckler origin heifers increased from 326kg in the 2015 period to 329kg in the 2016 period.

#### Young Bulls

As mentioned earlier, the proportion of young bulls in the NI prime cattle kill during the second quarter of 2016 has increased when compared to the corresponding period in 2015. During the 2016 period 14.7 per cent of the total NI prime cattle kill were young bulls compared to 11 per cent in the corresponding period in 2015. Current market specifications require young bulls to be slaughtered at under 16 months and during the 2016 period 69 per cent of price reported young bulls met this requirement. This was an improvement from the 2015 period when 65 per cent of young bulls were slaughtered under 16 months of age.

In contrast with the overall increase in conformation scores of steers slaughtered, there has been a general downward shift in the conformation scores of young bulls during quarter two of 2016 as indicated in Table 3. In the 2016 period U grade young bulls accounted for 19.3 per cent of the price reported young bull kill compared to 20.8 per cent in the 2015 period. The proportion of young bulls achieving an R grade also recorded a decline, accounting for 20.6 per cent of carcases in the 2016 period compared to 21.8 per cent in the 2015 period.

The proportion of O grade young bull carcases however recorded a notable increase year on year to account for 41 per cent of the NI young bull kill in the 2016 period. This was an increase of 5.4 percentage points from the

Figure 1: Proportion of the NI prime cattle kill sourced from the dairy herd by type during April-June 2015 and 2016



previous year when the proportion of O grade carcases was 35.6 per cent. P grade carcases accounted for 17.5 per cent of young bull carcases in the 2016 period and this was a decline of 2.4 percentage points from 19.9 per cent in the 2015 period.

During the 2016 period there has also been a change to the source of young bulls killed when compared to year earlier levels which will again have been one factor behind the increase in the proportion of O grade carcases in the slaughter mix. In the 2015 period 56.6 per cent of the young bull kill in NI was sourced from the dairy herd and 43.4 per cent were sourced from the suckler herd. However in the 2016 period the proportion of young bulls sourced from the dairy herd increased to account for 59.1 per cent of the

young bull kill with the proportion sourced from the suckler herd declining to 40.9 per cent.

The general downward shift in the conformation scores achieved by the NI young bull kill year on year has coincided with a decrease in the average young bull carcase weight from 315kg in the 2015 period to 310kg in the 2016 period. The average carcase weight of dairy origin young bulls declined by 3kg to 272kg in the 2016 period while the average carcase weight of suckler origin young bulls declined by 1kg to 366kg in the 2016

#### **Deadweight Cattle Trade**

UOTES from the major NI processing plants this week for prime cattle strengthened from 326-332p/kg with the majority of plants quoting in the region of 330p/kg. The plants have indicated tighter supplies of prime cattle combined with steady demand as the key factors behind the firming of the trade. Quotes for good quality 0+3 grade cows this week ranged from 238-250p/kg. Similar quotes are expected for all types of cattle early next week.

A total of 5,085 prime cattle were slaughtered in NI plants last week which is five per cent lower than the 5,348 prime cattle slaughtered in the corresponding week in 2015. Cow throughput in NI has remained strong with 1,977 cows killed in NI last week, very similar to the corresponding week in 2015 when 2,009 cows were killed lo.

Prime cattle imports from ROI for direct slaughter in NI plants last week totalled to 136 head. This was an increase from the 103 prime cattle imported during the previous week however below the corresponding week in 2015 when 298 prime cattle were imported for direct slaughter. A total of 91 cows were imported from ROI last week for direct slaughter compared to 112 head in the corresponding week last year. Meanwhile 67 cows were exported from NI for direct slaughter in ROI plants last week, a decrease from the previous week when 183 cows were exported to ROI. Exports of prime cattle to GB for direct slaughter last week totalled 29 head, a decrease of 126 head from the corresponding week in 2015 when 155 prime cattle were exported to GB for slaughter.

The average steer price in NI last week was up by 2.6p/kg to 324.9p/kg while the R3 steer price was up by 0.5p/kg to 334.4p/kg. This was the fourth consecutive week in which it recorded an increase and was the highest weekly R3 steer price in NI since early August 2015. The average heifer price in NI last week increased by 2p/kg to 324.2p/kg while the R3 heifer price increased by 3.5p/kg to 333.2p/kg. The average cow price in NI last week was unchanged at 229.7p/kg while the O3 cow price was up by 1.6p/kg to 249.6p/kg.

In GB last week the average steer price was unchanged at 336.2 p/kgwhile the R3 steer price increased by 0.7p/kg to 346.2p/kg. The differential in R3 steer prices last week between NI and GB was 12.8p/kg, the widest differential since early April this year. The average heifer price in GB last week was up by 2p/kg to 339.5p/kg while the R3 heifer price was up by 1.3p/kg to 346.7p/kg. This puts the differential in R3 heifer prices between NI and GB last week at 13.5p/kg which is the equivalent of £45 on a 330kg carcase.

In ROI last week deadweight prices for prime cattle decreased in euro terms however remained relatively steady in sterling terms. The R3 steer price in ROI last week was back marginally to 318p/kg while the R3 heifer price was back by 0.6p/kg to 328.1p/kg. The 03 cow price in ROI last week was also back marginally to 243.2p/kg which places it 6.4p/kg below the O3 cow price in NI and 4.3p/kg below the O3 cow price in GB.

#### **Deadweight Sheep Trade**

UOTES from the major NI processors for R3 grade lambs started this week at 360-365p/kg however quotes firmed towards the end of the week to 375-380p/kg. Similar quotes are expected for early next week. Strong supplies of lambs have continued to come forward for slaughter with throughput last week totalling 11,073 head. Exports of sheep to ROI for direct slaughter last week also remained strong and with a total of 7,000 head exported compared to 7, 149 the previous week. The average deadweight lamb price in NI last week was back by 11p/kg to 381.9p/kg while the average deadweight lamb price in ROI last week was back by 16.8p/kg to 384.5p/kg.

### This week's marts

EPORTS from marts this week have indicated steady numbers of lambs passing through the sale rings with the trade back slightly from previous weeks. In Omagh last Saturday 707 lambs sold from 329-379p/kg compared to 740 lambs the previous week selling from 356-411p/kg. In Massereene this week 947 lambs sold from 325-355p/kg compared to 967 lambs the previous week selling from 345-370p/kg. In Rathfriland this week 685 lambs sold from 330-388p/kg compared to 1,136 lambs the previous week selling from 315-405p/kg. In Ballymena this week 1,122 lambs sold to an average of 345p/kg compared to 1,740 lambs the previous week selling an average of 321p/kg. The ewe trade remained steady with a top reported price of £128 in Rathfriland on Tuesday.
