The Charity Commission for Northern Ireland (the Commission) was established by the Charities Act (Northern Ireland) 2008 (the Charites Act). As an employer the Commission promotes equality of opportunity and good relations, however as a regulator the Commission has very few opportunities to directly promote these duties in the charity sector. It does so by raising awareness of the promotion of good relations, equal opportunities and inclusion of people with a disability on public life among charity trustees.

The role of the Commission includes publication of details of charities. There are currently 393 organisations whose purposes and other details are displayed on the Commission's website which have the advancement of human rights, conflict resolution or reconciliation or the promotion of religious or racial harmony or equality and diversity among their purposes. While 1539 charities have the relief of those in need by reason of youth, age, ill-health, disability.

The end of 2019-20 saw the emergence of the COVID-19 crisis. The Commission has moved swiftly to set up remote working arrangements and to develop practical advice for charities who are deeply involved in the response to this crisis and are also threatened by it. While unplanned, the introduction of remote working for all staff has also enabled the Commission to provide adjustments for staff with underlying health conditions and to assist those with emerging caring responsibilities. Various business plan targets were impacted but despite these challenges, by the end of the year there were details of over 6,150 charities, and over 5,000 charity accounts and reports on the Commission's website. These accounts in combination reveal £2.1 billion of charity income being accounted for to the general public, through the Commission's website.

Other key activities during 2019-20 included 100% of self-regulatory concerns about charities processed to closure within six months of receiving a full risk assessment (target: 80%) and a consultation on Commission proposals to change the annual reporting regulations.

Stakeholders to this consultation also had the opportunity to comment on proposed new questions for charity registration.

In 2019-20 two applications for charity registration were refused. None of these refusals were related to equality issues or involved charities who's purposes related to the promotion of equal opportunities or good relations.

During the year, five pieces of new or updated guidance were published, including new guidance around specific areas of enquiries work and running and managing a charity. A full list is available at Appendix 1. Many more pieces were updated but the changes to these was not significant enough to count as new publications. The development of all policies and guidance involved a written analysis of their potential effects on equality of opportunity, good relations and the disability duties. The original equality screens of guidance which is being updated is also revisited to check whether anything has changed from an equality perpsective.

During the year the Commission participated in 39 engagement events in venues across Northern Ireland. At each event organised by the Commission we ensured accessibility needs were considered in advance and adjustments provided where necessary. We also invited feedback from participants [Equality Scheme 3.2]. For example, we delivered nine registration workshops (270 attendees) and one Annual Reporting infomation session (45 attendees), with a range of organisations including those whose beneficaries are drawn from one or more of the Section 75 categories. Some attendees at these events requested advance copies of materials in hard copy form, which were provided. One attendee, a wheelchair user, requested the Commission pay travel expenses. This request was refused as this is an expense which the organisation being represented by this individual is responsible for. Another request which the Commission agreed to was a face-to-face meeting for charity trustees for whom English is not their first language.

The internal system, which the Commission uses to monitor the implementation of the Equality Scheme, action plan and our response to stakeholders, has been fully implemented and maintained. The system consists of a monthly review of equality undertaken by all programme and project teams and a quarterly report on equality provided to the Senior Management Team (SMT). The quarterly report includes a list of policies developed in the quarter, screening decisions and information on the rationale for any of these decisions. Each quarter an overview of each screening report conducted during this period is posted on the website. These processes are subject to an internal assurance check on a quarterly basis.

Due to the nature of its work the Commission has limited opportunities to promote good relations on the basis of differing political opinion. We attempt to achieve this by providing a harmonious working environment for staff and being respectful in our use of languages with all stakeholders.

Finally, the work of the Commission in promoting public trust and confidence in charities, through the creation of an accessible and transparent source of information on local charities operating in Northern Ireland, is a very positive step in helping to promote equality of opportunity and good relations more broadly.

By the end of 2019-20, over 14,800 organisations listing people within a specific s.75 group as their main beneficiaries, as well as those organisations established for the advancement of human rights, conflict resolution or religious or racial harmony, had their information displayed in the Commission's website. For example over 500 charities listed their main beneficiaries as people from ethnic minorities with 148 charities listing Irish Travellers among their beneficaries. This information is freely available to members of the public and other stakeholders through a search of the Commission's website.

To assist the public, researchers and other stakeholders to use the information on the website, the Commission published *Using and understanding the register of* charities guidance in April 2019.

No investigation has been opened by the Commission on the basis of an equality ground being breached, however, issues concerning equality categories can be an aspect of the concerns reported to the Commission.

Outcomes and Improvements achieved

We received one informal complaint in line with our Equality Scheme in this period. An individual complained that receipt of documents was not acknowleged by the Commission and that this treatment arose from his ethnicity. Commission records showed the documents had been delivered by hand, scanned and signed for by a Commission staff member. When this information was shared, the individual decided not to proceed to a formal complaint.

The annual internal training for staff focussed on creating a harmonious work environment for all staff of the Commission. The training attracted 100% attendance and positive feedback.

Through the monthly equality assurance undertaken at project and programme teams we have ensured that all decision making has been evidence based and resulted in no negative impacts on individuals or organisations as a result of a s.75 characteristic.

Those submitting registration applications can provide feedback to the Commision via an online survey. Likewise those submitting an annual monitoring return also have the opportunity to complete a voluntary questionnaire. We use the feedback we receive from these surveys to monitor stakeholder experience of the accessibility of our services. In 2019-20 we received over 461 responses to the questionnaires. Although not all questions were answered by all respondents the feedback shows:

- 46% of respondents were female and 53% male, one person preferred not to say.
- 84% of respondents were aged 46 or over, 14% aged 26-45, with two respondents aged 19-25 years.
- 10% of respondents identified themselves as having a disability. These included disabilities related to physical, sensory, progressive and mental health conditions.

During 2019-20 the Commission has taken forward an action plan, developed in line with the Commission's latest business plan, which sets out the main initiatives designed to promote equality of opportunity, good relations, positive attitudes towards people with disabilities, and the participation of people with disabilities in public life. This will continue until it is due for renewal in 2022-2023.

During 2019-20 the Commission received 10 requests for reasonable adjustments. This is a decrease of one since last year. These included: providing hard copies of documentation and printing them in larger text.

The Commission also received a request for anonymity for each of the charity trustees of a charity representing transgendered people. An overview of the issues and approach to this request are set out below:

The role of the Commission includes the maintenance of public trust, confidence and transparency in charities operating in Northern Ireland. The Commission is also tasked to create and make public details of those who meet the requirements to be registered as charities in Northern Ireland in a 'register' which is on the Commission's website and includes details such as names of charity trustees, contact address etc.

The Commission aims to act reasonably and can allow anonymity of names instead of full publication. However, given the importance of transparency Commissioners must have compelling information on why anonymity is appropriate. Requests for anonymity are decided on an individual basis rather than a blanket decision for all charity trustees.

This charity representing transgendered people, whose trustee names had previously been published on the Commission's website expressed concern that the publication of names could reveal aspects of the medical history, in particular gender dysphoria, of a trustee or their close family. As currently drafted this charity's constitution allows for anyone to be a charity trustee if they have a diagnosis of gender dysphoria or if they are a well-wisher or person with special knowledge/experience useful to the charity.

The Commission's initial view was that, for this reason, the publication of basic names would not necessarily reveal a particular medical history.

They also raised the issue of personal safety. The Commission has, on a number of occasions, granted anonymity for these reasons of personal safety where evidence of threat has been provided. This case may also involve issues of human rights.

As an interim measure the Commission has removed the names of these trustees from display on the website. Exploration of the legal issue and discussion with the charity trustees is currently ongoing.

Feedback is gathered from Commission events such as workshops and information events. These record 92% of attendees reporting the accessibility of these events as either Excllent or Good. This information informs future planning for service delivery. The Commission believes ensuring the accessibility of events also increases our impact on good relations and equality. Feedback is also gathered from a post-registration survey which is undertaken on a voluntary basis when an

application for charity registration is completed. A similar post annual reporting survey is also available. Details from these surveys are available under question 26.

Staff Training (Model Equality Scheme Chapter 5)

The Commission fulfilled its Equality Scheme training commitment by providing an in-house equality training session for staff. Sessions were held on 22 & 29 October 2019 and 100% of Commission staff as well as temporary agency staff attended.

A session on equality and the Commission's Equality Scheme commitments has been incorporated into the induction training provided to all staff, including temporary staff. This has helped raise awareness of equality issues generally. Feedback from temporary staff indicates that they found this training informative and felt it would be transferable to positions which they would take up in the future.

Public Access to Information and Services (Model Equality Scheme Chapter 6)

The Commission includes in its communications a request that we be informed of any accessibility requirements and a process is in place to deal with requests for information in alternative formats. During 2019-20 the Commission received 10 requests for special circumstances and dealt with these on a case by case basis providing a range of adjustments including: requests for hard copies of documentation and an adjustment to emailed communications.

In 2019-20 we received over 461 responses to the questionnaires. Although not all questions were answered by all respondents the feedback shows:

- 46% of respondents were female and 53% male, one person preferred not to say.
- 84% of respondents were aged 46 or over, 14% aged 26-45, with two respondents were aged 19-25 years.
- 10% of respondents identified themselves as having a disability. These included disabilities related to physical, sensory, progressive and mental health conditions.

During 2019-20 the Commission has taken forward an action plan, developed in line with the Commission's latest business plan, which sets out the main initiatives designed to promote equality of opportunity, good relations, positive attitudes towards people with disabilities, and the participation of people with disabilities in public life.

The Commission also asks respondents to the voluntary post registration and post annual reporting surveys, how easy or difficult they found the online system. There were only 68 respondents to the post registration survey, 81 percent of whom reported finding the online system 'very easy' or 'fairly easy' to use. However the numbers replying to the survey were very small and not statistically significant. This is partly due to the voluntary nature of the survey and the smaller numbers of organisations called forward to register by the Commission during 2019-20.

However 393 people responded to the post annual reporting survey. Of those who responded to the question on using the online system 64 per cent (200) found the system 'very easy' or 'fairly easy' to use. 22 per cent (67) reported finding the system 'fairly or very difficult' to use.

Of those who had difficulty with the system 30 per cent (20) contacted the Commission for assistance. Of those who contacted the Commission for assistance 80 per cent (16) reported finding this contact 'very' or 'fairly helpful', while 20 per cent (4) respondents reported finding the contact 'fairly' or 'very unhelpful'.

Only 2 per cent of respondents (8 people) indicated that English is not their first language.

The Commission has a subtitled video of the annual reporting system and screenshots to enable charity trustees to see the questions before logging on to the system.

We will continue to monitor this feedback and identify where we can identify opportunities to improve the ease with which the online system can be accessed and used.

In response to the introduction of the Public Sector Bodies (Websites and Mobile Applications) (No. 2) Accessibility Regulations 2018, the Commission will be focussing on ensuring that its website continues to be compliant with accessibility requirements. However there are no specific areas of the Equality Scheme arrangements which the Commission anticipates focussing on during the next reporting period. Through the implementation of the *Integrated Equality Scheme and action plan* the Commission has ensured that our decision making has been evidence based and resulted in no negative impacts on individuals or organisations with specific s.75 characteristics. We have also used our position as regulator to highlight the issues of equality and particularly the inclusion of people with disabilities in public life.

During the seven years of the Equality Schemes' operation there has not been any significant change in the work and functions of the Commission or our stakeholders. We have aligned the scheme to the latest corporate plan and updated the action plan for implementation over the next two years.
