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### 1. Background


### 1.1 Background to PRONI

The Public Record Office of Northern Ireland (PRONI) is the official archive for Northern Ireland.

It aims to identify and preserve records of historical, social and cultural importance and make them available for the information, education and enjoyment of the public.

PRONI is the official place of deposit for public records in Northern Ireland. In addition, it collects a wide range of archives from private sources.

PRONI also advises on and promotes best practice in archive and records management to ensure that today's records will be available for future generations.



### 1.2. Methodology and quality of the data

The main purpose of these statistics is to give a broad overview of PRONI. The base year is 2015/16 and, where appropriate, other years are also included.

- In September 2010, PRONI began the move of records to new, purpose built accommodation in the Titanic Quarter in Belfast. PRONI was closed to the public from September 2010 until March 2011. As a result, caution should be taken when comparing 2010/11 figures with other years.
- Figures less than 0.5% are denoted by '0', while no responses are represented by '-'.
- Percentages may not add to 100% due to rounding.
- Data is validated by PRONI on an ongoing basis and quality assured by DfC Analytical Services Unit.

### 2. Accommodation and holdings

### 2.1 Accommodation at PRONI 2015/16

- PRONI is located in Titanic Quarter Belfast.
- There are 10,000 square metres of accommodation at PRONI.
- The reading room has 78 seats.
- The search room has 60 seats.
- There are 22 microfilm readers, 2 microfilm reader printers and 1 microfiche reader.

- From 2016, PRONI now hosts four General Registry Office of Northern Ireland (GRONI) terminals which allow users direct access to GRONI's most up to date Births, Marriages and Deaths database.
- A Registration of Deeds/House Mortgage Check Service is facilitated by Land & Property Services (LPS) staff in the PRONI Reading Room.

### 2.2 Holdings in PRONI 2015/16


- It was estimated that there are approximately three million documents stored in the archives at PRONI which fall under the categories of either public or private records.
- If all the boxes in the archive were laid down side by side, this would equate to 54 linear kilometres (33.6 linear miles).
- PRONI's oldest document is a bull of Pope Honorius the Third, dated 1219.

Potential deposits are reviewed to assess their suitability for preservation.

Records can come from central and local government, the courts and other public bodies, as well as private depositors.

• In 2015/16, 70 private deposits were accepted.

A PRONI box equals one linear foot and the measurement demonstrates the amount of space freed up in storage in public bodies.

• In 2015/16, there were 5,877 linear feet of records reviewed.





After records are reviewed and transferred to PRONI, staff undertake a programme of cataloguing by providing a description, e.g. file title and date, against each record or group of records.

- These catalogues accurately summarise the scope and content of PRONI's archives – 1.5 million catalogue item descriptions.
- There were 2,106 linear feet of items and 1,712 units of records catalogued in 2015/16.



There were 13,902 items created in the PRONI catalogue in 2015/16.


Items published refers to when items are made accessible to the public via the electronic catalogue [e-CATNI], which is available at PRONI's premises and via its website.

- There were 13,941 items published in the PRONI catalogue in 2015/16.
- A total of 1,312 government files were released in 2015/16. Of these, 306 files had some information blanked out, with the main reason for this being to protect personal information.
- A further 199 government files could not be released at all, again this was usually to protect personal information.

Besides the acquisition of records, PRONI's main statutory responsibility is the preservation of Northern Ireland's unique archival heritage.

- One method of preserving is capturing images of the records digitally.
- Making digital copies allows the records to be accessed without the original record being handled. They can also be viewed by more than one person at a time and many digital collections are now available online.

- There has been a change in the nature of preservation copying over the past few years. Projects which previously could not be undertaken are now possible with digitisation, for example, glass plate negatives are now captured, inverted and restored to a high quality which could not be done on film.
- In 2015/16, there were 31,109 digital frames captured.
- Increasingly, more time and professional expertise is required to produce an enhanced image suitable for wider access, in addition to the traditional preservation copy. The images generated include the initial image, a high resolution restored image for archival purposes and an image for access purposes.
- More resources, both equipment and staff time, were available in 2015/16 resulting in 118,046 image files being generated.

The images below are from the Eva Chichester Papers and show the Altmarkt, Dresden (PRONI ref: D4563). They demonstrate how an original image can be enhanced.

- 1. A session capture is the initial RAW format image as created by the digital camera system. From this original capture, other copies in various formats may be generated.
- 2. The images generated include the RAW format session captures, high resolution .tiff format images for archival purposes, and .jpeg format copies for access purposes.
- 3. In December 2013, a new PhaseOne P40+ camera with new CaptureOne v7 image capture software was acquired and installed. Previously a PhaseOne P30 with CaptureOne v3.1 was being used. The new equipment, and particularly the new software package, has enabled increased efficiency in the capture process. In March 2014, a second PhaseOne P40+ camera and a Book2Net book scanner were purchased, which have increased efficiency further.
- 4. During 2015/16, the majority of digitisation work involved creating surrogates of textual originals (e.g. manuscripts or printed documents), rather than photographic or pictorial originals (photographs, glass plate negatives, art works). There is much less post-capture processing work required when digitising textual originals as opposed to photographic or pictorial originals, therefore the process is much quicker and a greater volume of material can be digitised in a shorter period of time.


### Figure 4.2: Digital frames captured by project 2015/16



PRONI has a number of targets to measure performance. Original documents requested by visitors are retrieved from the stores, produced in the Reading Room for consultation and then returned to their designated locations in the stores.

The document production target for PRONI states that 94% of documents should be produced within 30 minutes of being requested.


• In 2015/16, 98% of documents were produced within 30 minutes. The average retrieval time per order was 14 minutes.



- In 2015/16, there were 2,806 written enquiries to PRONI's Public Services branch with 98% of responses to written correspondence meeting the target.
- In 2015/16, 82% of the responses to the 822 written correspondence enquiries to Records Management, Catalogue and Access branch met the target.


### Figure 6.3: Country of origin of new visitors in PRONI 2015/16


- There were nearly nineteen thousand visits by the public to PRONI in 2015/16. In addition 2,461 visited as part of internal public sector events and 937 visited as part of events arranged with partner organisations.
- 77% of visits by the public were to the Search Room/ Reading room in PRONI, while 13% of people attended PRONI events and 9% as part of a group.

- In 2015/16, 96% of respondents were satisfied with their visit.




**Group visit at PRONI**

- PRONI has a programme of digitising significant archives to make them accessible to the public online.
- There were 522,417 visits and 317,837 visitors to the PRONI website in 2015/16.
- There were over 10 million page views in 2015/16.



 During 2015/16, PRONI added 110 photographs to the Flickr photostream. This brought the total number of PRONI photographs available to view on Flickr to 2,892. In 2015/16, 636 photos were favourited, 62 comments were added to photographs and there were 2,786,542 photo views.





## 9. Glossary

### 9.1 Glossary

Category	Description
E-catalogue	PRONI's electronic catalogue containing over 1.5 million search- able entries.
Freeholders	Searchable database and associated digitised images of pre-1840 registers and poll books listing those entitled to vote at elections.
Name search	A searchable database of indexes for records that no longer exist including pre-1858 wills, diocesan wills; surviving fragments of 1740-66 dissenters petitions; and 1775 dissenters petitions.
Street Directories	Searchable database and associated digitised images of Belfast and Ulster Street Indexes, 1819-1900 listing names of principal inhabitants, merchants, shopkeepers, etc.
Ulster Covenant	Searchable database and associated digitised images relating to the half a million original signatures and addresses of those who signed the Ulster Covenant and Declaration on 28 September 1912.
Valuation revision books	Searchable database of placename index and digitised images of the Valuation Revision Books (VAL/12/B) for the years 1864-1933.
Web archive	Searchable database of c. 150 archived public sector websites.
Will calendars	Searchable catalogue of will calendar entries for the period 1858- 1965.
