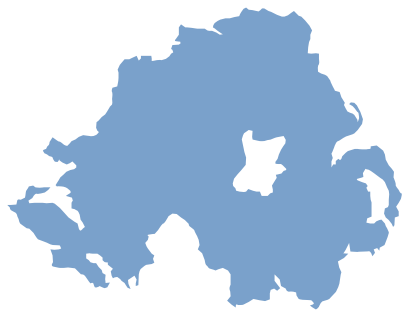

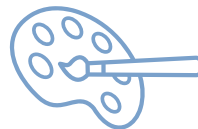

Overview 2023-24

“The Arts Council’s outgoing 2019-2024 strategic plan, *Inspire, Connect, Lead*, covered a period in which the sector faced the most serious of challenges, including a pandemic, a cost-of-living crisis, a lengthy period without a functioning Northern Ireland Executive and reducing investment support. Yet, and despite all of this, our remarkable artists and arts organisations have never failed to find innovative, flexible, and creative ways to keep on delivering and contributing in major ways to the quality of life in Northern Ireland.”

A challenging year for the arts

The findings of our annual [survey of regularly-funded organisations](#), conducted in 2023/24, showed that workforce levels had returned in the previous year broadly to pre-Covid levels and earned income had grown by 72 percent. These welcome improvements to the health of the arts sector were, however, somewhat countered by other factors, including the decline in income from European funding sources as legacy projects funded before the UK’s exit from the EU come to an end; and by a continuing rise in energy and living costs, with their subsequent impact on the running and programming costs of arts organisations.

Closer international collaboration

The Arts Council continued to share intelligence with the sector about international opportunities through our participation in the Arts Infopoint UK initiative, and we supported new opportunities for Northern Ireland’s artists and arts organisations through the Four Nations International Fund, the UK-Germany Cultural Bridges exchange programme, and the Franco-UK artists’ residency programme, Magnetic. The two arts councils on the island of Ireland extended our long history of collaboration by laying the groundwork for a new all-island dance company to be established in 2024/25.

Further cuts to the Arts but renewed optimism following restoration of NI Executive

A five percent reduction to the Arts Council’s Exchequer budget in 2023-24 added significantly to the pressure on the sector and the Arts Council as principal funder.

The Arts Council continued to press throughout the year for the [reversal of this cut](#) and for parity of funding with the rest of the UK and Ireland. We provided research and intelligence on the arts, including our findings from the 2022/23 [General Population Survey](#), which demonstrated the public’s overwhelmingly positive support both for the arts and for government investment in the arts.

The restoration of devolved government in Northern Ireland in February 2024, following a two-year hiatus, and the appointment of a local Minister with direct responsibility for the arts, introduced fresh opportunity for a change in direction and the start of a process of reinvestment in the arts.

Arts Council investment

In 2023-24 the Arts Council invested £21 million through our funding programmes, supporting the full range of arts activities throughout Northern Ireland. This included interventions in areas of identified need, including our Arts and Older People Programme, Young People and Wellbeing Arts Programme, Creative Schools Partnership, Rural Engagement Arts Programme and Digital Evolution Programme.

We launched our new [website](#), which presents accessible information about the support we provide through funding, resources, news content, and advocacy. We also partnered with Arts Council England, Arts Council of Wales and Creative Scotland, to launch a new website, <https://allin.online/>, part of a developing UK-wide access scheme, designed to enhance the experience of D/deaf, disabled and neurodivergent people attending creative and cultural events.

Towards a new long-term strategy

2023/24 marked the final year of the Arts Council's 5-year Strategy, *Inspire, Connect, Lead*. The development of a new strategy occupied the Arts Council throughout the year in our most extensive consultation exercise to date, engaging with the widest possible range of stakeholders. In April 2024, less than a month into the new financial year, we published our first 10-year Strategic Plan 2024-34, [Championing the Arts](#). The new strategy charts the course towards a future in which everyone has the opportunity to enjoy a thriving arts sector that is valued for its contribution to creativity, wellbeing and social and economic prosperity.

Obituaries

We said goodbye this year to a number of significant personages associated with the arts in Northern Ireland, including the renowned painter and sculptor Deborah Brown, dramatist and author Maurice Leitch, and one of Stage Beyond Theatre Company's longest-serving members, Catherine Campbell. Tributes from around the world were also paid to the Irish-American philanthropist Chuck Feeney, who donated £6.5bn to various causes through his foundation, Atlantic Philanthropies, including the Arts Council's Arts and Older People Programme.

Artists and arts organisations entertained, inspired and enriched our lives throughout the year, supported by Arts Council Exchequer and National Lottery investment.

Frequently Asked Questions

How do I apply for funding?

The Arts Council offers a range of grant programmes that you can apply to for funding. Some programmes are specifically for organisations and others are for individual artists. We are currently reviewing our funding portfolio and we expect to introduce multi-annual funding to replace our Annual Funding Programme in 2026. We also intend to amalgamate all National Lottery Funding programmes into one main application route. When can I apply?

Most grant programmes take place in funding rounds with specific dates when we will accept applications. Some programmes are open all year round. For information on funding deadlines, visit the Funding pages of our website.

How long will it take to reach a decision?

This may vary with each programme, although we would generally aim to make a decision on applications from individuals and organisations within three months.

Where can I get help with my application?

The guidance notes for each programme provide information on the assessment criteria, eligibility and application process. Our Arts Development Officers can also offer [advice](#) on eligibility before you submit an application. Contact details are available in the [About Us](#) section of our website, or you can contact the switchboard and you will be directed to the most appropriate person.

How do I complain to the Arts Council?

The Arts Council has a Service Charter which outlines the standard of service our clients should expect from us. We operate a Service Complaints Procedure to handle general complaints about our service. In addition, we operate a Funding Review Procedure for those who want to appeal a decision about a grant application. These documents are available on the website.
